"Academic freedom should mean the free-dom of the student to learn rather than of the professor to profess," said a prominent edu-cator. The definition is sound; it suggests the ideal relationship that should exist between teacher and pupil and no other relationship could exist in a democratic public school. This was pointed out in a recent article by William Bigelow, editor of Good Housekeeping maga-zine.
