## Financial error

WASHINGTON - The space agency, already braced
for heavy cuts of its 1969 budget by the House next week, has suffered a new and damaging setback: An official report that it erred in not insisting that a muldimillion
dollar Lunar module subcontract be awarded through competitive bidding.
The subcontact for radar equipment, was estimated originally at $\$ 23.4$ million. It already has cost the government $\$ 112$ million, says the General Accounting
Office, the agency which checks executive spending for
Congress.
