The Billikens, suffering a relapse after their opener with University of Missouri, were held to a surprising scoreless tie by a strong Missouri School of Mines team while Rice Institute took the measure of the Gents 25 to 0 Saturday.

Previously the Bills had lost to Missouri 40 to 26 and the Gents had gone down before Texas Christian 41 to 6 and before Harding-Simmons 15 to 13.

Both George Baker, starting left tackle from Ida Grove, Iowa, and Leo Kerzich, his sophomore understudy from Keewatin, Minn., are expected to be kept on the sidelines by injuries with the result that Coach Dukes Duford of St. Louis university will shift Carl Zimmer, letterman tackle from St. Louis, to the other side of the line.

Coach Jake Hanna, opening his first year as coach of the Gents, will start four lettermen: Claude Teel at left end, Lavelle Murphy at right end, F. M. May at fullback and Norris McCrary at right tackle.
