Dramatic announcement of this fact came this morning from Fayetteville, Ark. where the Conference is holding its Probably Tech's best chances for a SWC champion- annual spring meeting. Final decision was made by the faculty athletic representatives in their meeting this morning.

The vote was unanimious.

Tech's admittance into the Conference climaxes many years work and activities of officials interested and connected with athletics on campus. Recent work along this line was spearheaded by efforts of DeWitt Weaver, athletic director, and Dr. J. William Davis, head of the athletic council, both of whom were in Fayetteville to receive the news.

Techsans faced the prospect of today's meeting more optimistic than almost any other time. In February a longtime opponent to conference expansion, Southern Methodist, announced that it had changed its opinion and would support Tech. This gave new momentum to Tech's cause.

New fire was badly needed to fan the flames of fervor after an unsuccessful admittance attempt was made in December at a meeting held in Dallas. A move to expand the conference to include the West Texas college failed after receiving four votes. Opponents were Rice, Arkansas and SMU.

A rumored "package deal" in which the University of Houston was to be admitted along with Tech failed to

# **Toreador Receives High ACP Rating**

A total of 1,560 points was chalked up by the paper — just 140 short of the number needed for All-American honors ----the highest rating attainable. In 1955, the paper received a Second Class rating, with a total of 1,470 points.

The new rating was made in competition with other bi-weekly college papers across the nation. Grading was divided into three main sections: coverage, content and physical property. The Toreador made a perfect score in each of the subdivisions of coverage: news sources, balance, treatment

Other subdivisions making a perfect score were headline writing and front page make-up. Sports coverage, the editorial page and inside news pages also scored high in the grading.

#### Tech President **Pearce Picks 14 Ventana Staffers Issues** Statement

Number 13 may be unlucky for some, but not for Texas Tech. Today, Tech bcame the 13th school to be admitted to the Southwest Conference, after years of "hard luck" in its bid for admittance.

Although there had been no change in the Conference since 1925, and no addition since 1922, the admittance of Tech today was the eighth re-shuffling in the history of the Southwest Conference. On May 6, 1914, representatives of eight Southwestern educational institutions met in Dallas

at the Oriental Hotel, to consider the formation of a Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. Institutions represented were Bay lor University, University of Oklahoma, Southwestern University, Oklahoma A&M, Texas A&M, Louisiana State University, University of Arkansas, and University of Texas.

On Dec. 8, 1914, representatives of the following institutions accepted the provisions of the Conference and became charter members: Texas A&M, Baylor, Arkan-Oklahoma, Rice, Oklahoma sas. A&M, Southwestern, and Texas.

In 1916, the word "Intercollegiate" was dropped from the chartered name of the organization, and "Southwest Athletic Conference" became the official name.

In this same year Southwestern University withdrew from the Conference, and in 1918 Southern Methodist University was admitted. Phillips University (Oklahoma) was admitted in 1919, but dropped out in 1921. The University of Oklahoma withdrew from membership in 1920.

Texas Christian University was elected to membership in 1922, and Oklahoma A&M withdrew in May 1925, leaving the conference with the membership it retained for 31 years. AND on May 12, 1956, Texas Technological College was ad-

I am sure that our unbounded joy over the news of Texas Tech's admission to the Southwest Conference must rank along with that which reigned in Lubbock when the news of th elocation of the College here was received thirty two years ago. We are highly gratified and supremely happy.

Admission fulfills the dreams and ambitions of the years. We are determined to be an asset to the Conference and sincerely believe we can do so. In fact, after World War II Tech began building again an Athletic Program which, in time, would merit such recognition. I congratulate Coach DeWitt Weaver upon that achievement.

Now we eagerly look forward to the years of wholesome rivalry and spirited competition with each and all of the seven splendid institutions which have composed the Conference.

The jounting interest in attaining membership has multiplied the friends of Texas Tech by the thousands. To all of them we are most grateful. Our thanks to those special friends who have worked so untiringly in our behalf are beyond expression. E. N. Jones, President

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

Long-time football contracts will probably prevent Texas Tech from being able to compete for the Southwest Conference championship before at least 1961.

Conference rules call for a champion to be named only after all teams have met each other in a round-robin schedule. This is unlike the Border Conference where only four games are necessary to pick a winner.

Due to prior committments of both Rice Institute and Southern Methodist, the Raiders probably will not appear on the schedule of those two schools until '61. It will be 1960 before Tech can be perlarge 27,000-seat Jones Stadium were made. Criticism of manently placed on Texas University schedule.

In direct contrast, Tech can go on the Baylor schedule immediately and games are already scheduled with Texas A&M and Texas Christian, however, these games are at intervals through 1961.

Tech last year split in their two encounters against SWC grid powers. The Raiders defeated the Texas Longhorns 20-14 and lost 32-0 to TCU. Coach DeWitt Weaver's men had their finest hour in 1951 when they walloped Conference champion TCU 33-19.

Other than these games the Raiders have a 17-47 record against SWC foes. They have fared best against SMU whom they have beaten 3 times while

losing 3. Their worst efforts have been against Rice who have beaten Tech 9 times while losing only 1 game. Other records against Southwest Conference teams are Texas 1-7, TCU 5-8, Baylor 4-9 and A&M 3-11.

son are representing KDUB radio and television at the historic meeting.



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
