

### **City Council Grants Almeria Lease Extension**

Tuesday morning representatives from Almeria, Inc. met with the City Council to ask for an extension of their real estate options. They talked to the councilmen about the benefits Almeria would have for the local economy. They stated that from the investment standpoint, Almeria was an ideal investment because there is no noise, smoke or chemical to harm the environment. For Almeria the site in Muleshoe is ideal because of the water.

They stated that it was a sound solid investmant. "The market is growing every year. People are turning away from red meat every day, and turning more to vegetables."

"We don't plan to compete with farmers or field crops. We will be growing specialty vegetables, fixed sweet peppers, special varieties of tomatoes, Japanese egg plant and Chinese long breans, as well as a bonus crop of baby beets and carrots.



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

which passed the U.S. House Agriculture Committee Tuesday may mean the difference between survival and bankruptcy for the state's dairy farmers, according to the Texas Farmers Union.

Members of the committee responded to the financial crisis experienced by dairy farmers because of the sharply lower milk prices under provisions of the 1990 farm bill," said the Texas Farmers Union President, Joe Rankin. "The committee bill represents a vastly improved policy." "It's not perfect, but it's a lot better than the present program."

Under the Agriculture Committee's bill, farmers would receive a support price of \$12.60 per hundredweight on a base level of production. Current wholesale milk prices are hovering at roughly \$10.00 per hundredweight. Dairy producers would be penalized for output above that base level with a much lower support price. The "tier" system is designed to discourage overproduction and thus stimulate market prices.




"While we regret that we had seven fatalities in Texas during the 30-hour July 4th holiday period, we were pleased to see that we fell short of our estimate that 12 persons would die on Texas' streets and highways during the holiday," said DPS Assistant Director Lt. Col. James Wilson.

The previous lowest July 4th traffic death count was in 1973, when 9 persons died during the Portales 30-hour holiday period. Four others died of injuries, pushing the final total to 13 deaths that year.

"Of the seven deaths reported this July 4th." Wilson said. "three were in motorcycle accidents, two in auto-pedestrian accidents and two in vehicle accidents. In both the vehicle accidents, the victim had not been wearing a safety belt. The count might have been even lower if they had been buckled up."

All available Highway Patrol Troopers were on the roadways during the holiday period, which Wilson said may have discouraged drunken driving and speeding, the two leading causes of traffic deaths.

"Texas motorists also deserve our thanks for helping make it a safer July 4th," Wilson said.





### **Healthier Eggs For Healthier People**

Researchers at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station hope to give new meaning to the term "good egg" by developing one that will reduce harmful dietary fats.

Such an egg might be slightly lower in cholesterol and also contain omega-3 fatty acids, a polyunsaturated or "good" fat that actually helps decrease the effects of "bad" dietary fats, said Dr. Pam Hargis, an Experiment Station scientist.

Omega-3 fatty acids are found from marine sources, primarily fish, and have received widespread publicity as reducing risks of coronary disease. Fish oils included in the diets of chickens can produce eggs with higher levels of omega-3 fatty acids, Hargis said.

The predominant fats in the American diet are omega-6 fatty acids, which are also polyunsaturated and from both plant and animal sources, and saturated fats from meat and dairy products.

Omega-6 fatty acids are not as harmful as saturated fats are, but their consumption relative to omega-3 consumption should still be lower, Hargis said.

Nutritionists currently recommend at least three weekly

contributes to declining consumption.

But dietary research has shown that eggs aren't as bad as once thought, particularly with overall healthy diets, Hargis said.

That's because improved scientific techniques have shown there are only about 213 milligrams of cholesterol in an average large-grade egg, compared to the 275 it was once thought, Hargis said.

But it's also because research by her team and others shows that most people's bodies adjust to varying levels of cholesterol and other fats.

The Texas A&M team gave 20 male volunteers either regular or omega-3-enriched eggs for a period of 12 weeks. Researchers then found similar blood-cholesterol levels among most participants.

The regular-egg group took approximately three weeks to adjust to the effect of eating more eggs, she said, but their blood-cholesterol levels came back down to their original values after initially rising.

"Most normal healthy individuals have the ability to metabolically regulate levels of fatty acids in their blood in response to diet," Hargis said. An average of one in 20 individuals will be what is termed "cholesterol non-responders," she said. Those people are unable to regulate cholesterol levels in their blood, largely because of their genetic make-

cholesterol) attach to tiny injuries in blood vessels, form a plaque and possibly occlude or block the vessel. Blood-vessel injuries occur naturally but are also caused by stresses like high blood pressure and smoking, Hargis said.

Probably the most important effect of omega-3 fatty acids is this anti-thrombolytic effect, Hargis said.

In any event, the good effects of enriched eggs are "very much dependent on other foods in the diet," Hargis said.

### **Crime Bill Edges Toward Being Passed**

Legislation aimed at reversing the crime wave that is sweeping America is nearing passage in the U.S. Senate, says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas.

"Government must wield the sword of justice to guarantee what has been called 'the first civil right' of every American. the right to be free from fear," said Gramm.

The crime bill already contains several provisions authored by Gramm, including these: -- A 10 year mandatory prison

sentence for adults convicted of

selling drugs to children.


--A mandatory life sentence for drug traffickers convicted for a third time.

In debate on the Senate floor, Gramm explained that his first amendment to the crime bill said simply that "if you are an adult and you sell drugs to a minor and you are arrested, indicted and convicted, that you are going to serve every day of 10 years in prison without parole no matter who your daddy is or how society has done you wrong.'

The second Gramm provision. he said, is designed to permanently eliminate career criminals from society.

"I call this amendment the three-time loser rule," Gramm said during the Senate debate. "We have crime without punishment in America. As a result, we have a lot of crime in America."

Both Gramm proposals were adopted by the Senate on voice votes and are now part of the pending crime bill.



servings of food containing omega-3 fatty acids as a way of improving dietary fat ratios.

However, the effect of good eggs as an alternative to fish will still depend on reasonable diets in which the consumption of saturated fats is limited, she said. In addition, eggs with too-high levels of omega-3 fatty acids can have "off" or undesirable flavors, she said.

Demand for eggs has declined drastically over the past decade, with much of the drop resulting from well-meaning efforts to cut. cholesterol consumption by the public, Hargis said.

Hargis, also an associate professor of poultry science at Texas A&M University, said some consumers deem eggs an inconvenient food, which also

The researchers did find, however, that blood triglyceride levels in the omega-3 group initially dropped by an average of 19 percent, then returned to normal levels. Triglycerides are fats that flow through the blood after meals, and high levels in the blood after fasting may pose a coronary risk to people with a family history of fatty acid disorders.

Omega-3 fatty acids also inhibit the process of thrombosis, in which lipids (such as

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### Humid Heat Can Be Deadly

An early heat wave, combined with high humidity, could lead to the deadly threat of heatrelated illness for many Texans.

Health officials warn that heat stress, or hyperthermia, contributed to 1,700 deaths in the U.S. during the humid summer of 1980. The victims of heat stress are usually the elderly, the very young, the poor, or people weakened by illnesses such as heart disease or alcoholism.

Dr. Jim Cheek, of the Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Disease Control and Epidemiology, said, "The first few days of a heat wave with high humidity are particularly dangerous." He explained that generally four to seven days are needed for people to acclimate to elevated temperatures. Dr. Cheek noted that most cases of serious heat-related illness

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occur early in the summer.

Heat-related illness includes a broad spectrum ranging from simple heat cramps to lifethreatening heat stroke. Although many persons with heat stroke have some form of debilitating disease, healthy young persons may develop heat stroke following strenuous physical exertion. The warning signs of impending heat stroke may be few, and loss of consciousness may be the first sign. Heat stroke is a medical emergency and care should be sought immediately.

Dr. Cheek stated the "people can prevent heat-related illness by drinking more fluids, preferably water, before exposure." In addition, he noted, "Particularly susceptible people such as the elderly and the very young should wear light, loosefitting clothing, take frequent baths, avoid strenuous activity, and remain in a cool place."

. Local weather forecasts can be a guide to the danger of heat-related illness. The "heat stress index," obtained from the National Weather Service reflects how hot the air feels to humans. A heat stress reading of 105 is considered very dangerous, yet can occur while temperatures are in the mid 80's.



"A jump in new housing permits and improved retail sales are contributing to the growing Texas economy," State Comptroller John Sharp said, releasing the latest version of the Lone Star 5.

"For only the second time since June 1987, more than 5,000 housing permits were issued in Texas in a month's time. This points to an improving real estate market and more jobs in the construction industry," Sharp said.

Housing permits are included in the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators, which also includes oil prices, new business incorporations, unemployment claims and stock prices. Along with Texas employment, industrial production, retail sales and the Consumer Price Index, the Comptroller's

Other components of the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators-- which tracks the state's economic future--also posted gains over the past year. "The length of the manufactring workweek, retail sales and the price of oil all have improved," Sharp said.

After all its components were compiled, the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators rose .4 percent above its level a year ago.

Between May 1990 and May 1991, Texas added 79,000 jobs for a 1.1 percent increase. "While most of this growth occurred in the latter half of 1990, it is still welcome news when compared to a 1.3 percent loss of 1.45 million jobs nationwide during the same period. Nationwide, May was the first month since last June that the nation added jobs, and if that trend continues, Texas will certainly feel the positive side effects," Sharp said.

The Texas Industrial Production Index, which measures changes in economic output in mining, manufacturing and utilities, rose .1 percent from April 1990 to April 1991. The U.S. Industrial Production Index, after falling for six straight months, increased in both April and May, but remains 3.2 percent below a year ago.

Texas retail sales, which measure consumer spending, rose faster than the rate of inflation, rising 7.4 percent from the fourth quarter of 1989 to the fourth quarter of 1990. Over the same period, U.S. retail sales were up 3.3 percent.
