Cagers Open Season With 36-30, 35-30 Victories

Texas Tech's Red Raider cagers rung up the curtain on a new basketball season at the gym Friday and Saturday nights, and rung down the curtain on the Kilgore Liberty Pipeliners with a pair of wins, 36 to 30 and 35 to 30.

Both victories were gained by last-half rallies that the visitors could not stop. In both games the Raiders were behind at half-time.

The victories indicate that the Techs are as strong as pre-season dope indicated them to be. The Pipeliner squad is composed of graduated all-Southwest conference stars.

Capt. Curly Risinger and Marshall Brown led the Raider scoring in the Friday game with 9 points each. J. D. Norton, former Southern Methodist star, paced the visitors with 11 points.

Time about is fair play so Saturday night Center Bauman Roper and Guard T. L. Gilley set the scoring pace, Roper with 11 points, Gilley with 9. Norton again led the Kilgore team with 13 points.

Howell Teaches Unusual Course

Students of Tech can feel individual in many ways, but not so individual as those students who are taking plant industry course number 331, "Plant Insects and Diseases and Their Control."

It is the only course of its kind taught in colleges and universities of the nation. O. B. Howell, professor of horticulture, said in an interview recently.

The course is designed to inform the horticulturist in recognition of the kinds of insects that prey upon plants, their diseases and control. Not only the horticulturists profit from the study of this course, but it is enlightening and beneficial to anyone engaged in any phase of agriculture.

A prerequisite to taking the course is junior standing in agriculture or biology. It deals with the most important fruit, vegetable and crop insects and diseases and their control. Lectures are also given on sprays, methods of spraying and spray calendars.

2. It will deprive students of periodic trips to Amarillo over weekends and the resultant bene-

fits of alcoholic research undertaken there;

3. It will substitute a mild intoxicant for the hard, devastating, man-sized job of drinking gin, whiskey and straight alcohol to be found at almost every drug center in this area;

4. It will empty the city jails on Saturday nights;

5. It will prevent stupid, stumbling, blind drunkenness;

6. It will help the state and county financially;

7. It will prevent one of the college's most serious discipline problems;

8. It will put students in church Sunday mornings instead of in bed sleeping off the evil effects of hard liquor.

Lubbock county citizens are not removing temptation but are making that temptation much more exciting and daring by putting up a county line barrier. We advocate that every able-bodied voter should go to the polls, if an election is called, and vote in beer for the sake of the temperance of our youth.

search laboratories at Bloomfield, N. J.
Later the lecturer will put light to play. He will pour music out of a coffee percolator. He will also turn a flashlight on three electric eyes and cause a set of chimes to ring. Such musical virtuosity illustrates the manner in which photo-electric cells are today performing important tasks of counting and sorting in industrial processes. The precipitron, an electrostatic device for cleaning air, will be demonstrated. It has been developed by Westinghouse engineers and is now in operation in several experimental installations in Washington, Chicago and elsewhere.
