Tuition rally results in visit to Tech president

About 250 students-at the peak of the demonstration-gathered at Memorial Circle Friday afternoon to protest the proposed hike in tuition offered as a money-raising idea by Gov. Preston

The rally, led by Bruce Barrick and Kathy Williams, started off with the raising of a flag similar to that of the Texas flag-with the only difference being a dollar sign replacing the lone

The demonstration was highlighted with a march through the Administration Building, the University Center, past several of the dorms and then back to the Administration Building plaza, a burning of a stuffed dummy representative of Gov. Smith and a talk by the students with Dr. Grover Murray, Tech president.

The students, upon returning to the Administration Building, stormed into Murray's office and demanded to see the president.

Headless doll branded prank by DA's office

A decapitated doll mailed to Tech professor Kent M. Rylander has been branded a bizarre prank by the district

attorney's office. Rylander received the doll in a package Feb. 17 and turned it over to Dist. Att. Blair Cherry. The doll had been stuffed into a child's shoe box with red crepe paper. A black substance had been

smeared under the eyes. The district attorney's office indicated Thursday the incident was apparently nothing but a prank since the package had a fictitous return address and had

been mailed in Lubbock. Rylander, a biology professor, was instrumental in helping to apprehend the convicted killer of Mrs. Sarah Alice Morgan, Tech cleaning woman who was slain Dec. 4, 1967 in a third floor science

Detectives staked out Rylander's office March 13, 1968, and arrested Tech graduate student Benjamin Lach after a high-speed chase through west Lubbock. He is currently serving a 40-year prison

term for the slaying.

The students were first confronted by Murray's secretary, Jean Baker, who told the students that he was in conference and could not see anyone that afternoon. She did, however, say she would make appointments for the students with Murray.

When it appeared that every student in the reception area wanted an appointment with Murray, Mrs. Baker retreated to her office and Murray appeared in a few minutes.

Murray told the congregation he would meet with them, but outside the Administration Building.

Murray told the students that their side had been well presented to members, of the Texas legislature. "The state also has a side in that it needs additional funds to keep the institution going, to build buildings. The side has also been presented to them (legislature)."

He told those gathered that the best course of action for students was to write their legislators and tell them how the students feel on the tuition increase

"They know my position, because I have presented both sides. We had needs for money and at the same time I pointed out to them that it does serve as a financial problems in the case of certain people," Murray informed the students.

When questioned on the rational of such a large increase in tuition all at once, Murray said, "I personally feel that if there is going to be an increase in tuition it would have been better to have carried it out over a periood of time."

The rally started off with impromptu speeches by anyone who wanted to step to the foot of the flag poles.

One of the first to speak was Barbee Anderson, candidate for secretary of the Student Association. Others before her had asked that each student there write their legislators and tell them of their sentiments on the proposed bill.

Miss Anderson added that each student should write their parents and should write their legislators. She stated the parents would have a larger voice with the Austin lawmakers since they are the ones who spend the most money.

One of the last to speak before the protestors started their march was Jim Boynton, for Tech senator.

Boynton suggested that the students

write the senators rather than to members of the house of representatives.

"Although the battle is fought in each house, you can pretty well write off the House of Representatives. This is still your representatives of the cows and horses out in the farm land somewhere.

"But the senate has finally come of age. And this is where we need to base the battles if we are going to do any battle with the legislature. This is where our best chance lies of getting the bills either crushed or amended in such a way that is fairly plausible to us," Boynton stated.

The only police interference during the rally was shortly after the mock Texas flag was raised. Traffic security officers rushed to the flag pole to remove the flag, but were thwarted in their attempt to lower the flag after a member of the Free Speech committee placed a lock on the flag raising device. The officers finally circumvented the lock and took away the flag.

Lubbock's own Preston Smith was burned in effigy during the tuition rally Friday afternoon. The group met in Memorial Circle and then paid a surprise visit to Tech president Grover Murray.

VP candidates give platforms

The Vice President's most important function is to preside over the Student Senate of Texas Tech. He can neither propose nor discuss a bill on the Senate floor. He has no vote except in a tie ballot. His abilities, however, are restricted to the appointing of Senate committees and serving on the President's Cabinet.

As your Vice President, I would improve the workability of the Student Senate by expanding these powers within

As Vice President, I would seek out and meet with the side variety of student organizations providing forums for both explanation and suggestion. Only with such a twoway communication can the present gap between the Tech student and his government be bridged.

I would act as mediator between the President and the Senate. I would assist the President in such programs as the legal aid to students and the true im-

plementation of the Student Bill of Rights. Communication could also be improved by the re-structuring and streamlining of Senate committees. Too, something must be done to correct such immediate problems as the shameful dormitory food and lack of seating at athletic events.

Most importantly, I appeal to you to vote in this election so that student government can actually be a

representative body for you. JIM CHIDESTER

As candidate for Vice-president of the Student Association, my outstanding qualification for the office is my desire to serve in the capacity. I pledge to give my best to the office.

The Student Senate just recently approved a "Student Bill of Rights" soon to be submitted to the student body for their approval. This bill of rights needs to then be submitted to the Code of Student Affairs Committee for incorporation into the code. We as students must give this bill of rights our total support if it is to be of any significance on this campus.

The Student Association should take steps as soon as funds become available under the new optional fee system to retain an attorney to act as legal counsel for the Student Association. I see a definite need for investigation of where the Bookstore and vending machine profits are actually going. This is student money and should be in the direct service of student needs. Concerning the residence halls we need to continue to work for the end of the on campus living requirement.

A semester contract would also allow the resident more freedom than he presently has with the nine month contract. We need to maintain the present system of monthly payments rather than paying by semester as proposed by the administration.

The only realistic solution to the food service problem is to go to a contract food service system. Concerning the Pass-Fail system, students should be able to change into or out of Pass-Fail until the last day to drop a course with a W each semester. On reorganization within the Senate the role of the present Allocations committee should be expanded to deal with the financial affairs of the student body as a whole rather than just the S.A. budget.

The College Councils should be provided a special docket where they may originate legislation within the senate.

Student government students attend conference at A&M

Two Tech Student Government students attended the Student Conference on National Affairs (SCONA) at College Station last week to study the legal rights and academic freedom for

students. Mike Levenson, director of the College Allowance Program (CAP) and Ellen McDaniel, student senator, represented Tech at the conference to exchange ideas with other student leaders at several colleges and universities across the

The conference has been held at Texas A&M for the past 16 years, and has attracted such speakers as former President Lyndon B. Johnson and former Vice President Hubert Humphrey, several U.S. Senators, ambassadors and astronauts.

A&S students may determine curriculum

Students in the College of Arts and Sciences may have the chance to determine their own curriculum if the efforts of the Council of the College of Arts and Sciences prove successful.

Larry Gallagher, chairman of the A&S Council, said they are working with the Curriculum Committee to let five students serve on it.

The college councils establishment was the idea of the Academics Committee of the Student Senate. Eventually, each college of the university will have one. The purpose of the councils was to set up better lines of communication within the colleges by having representatives of organizations in each college meet


Gallagher said students can channel their requests and suggestions to the Curriculum Committee through the college council. This can be done by either attending the next meeting of the council at 6:30 p.m. March 9 in room 155 of the BA Building, or by writing to Gallagher at Box 4664, Tech Station.

The A&S College Council is also working with the dean of the college to set up a student counseling service. This would include counseling on academic affairs, but would not be restricted to that area only, said Gallagher.

Three Tech coeds die in wreck

Memorial services for three members of Alpha Delta Phi sorority who were killed Friday night in a car crash 32 miles east of Roswell, N.M., will be at 5:30 p.m. today in St. Christopher's Episcopal Church, 42nd and Elgin Streets.

The three killed were Deborah Madden of Lubbock, Sherry Melinder of Houston and Mendy Parkison of Dallas.

Three other members of the sorority were injured in the crash. Two of the three are still hospitalized in St. Mary's Hospital in Roswell. They are Marta Whitsell, 19, of Houston, listed in serious

condition, and Marsha Guess, 20, of Rogers in good condition with a broken ankle. Maryanne Westphal, 19, Odessa, was treated and released from the hospital.

Officers indicated the girls were on a skiing trip at Ruidosa. Their car overturned at least six times after the driver apparently failed to negotiate a curve. All six girls were thrown from the auto,

Church. Burial will be in Resthaven Memorial Park.




