

House approves bill

WASHINGTON - A bill to create four new federal judgeships in Texas was approved Tuesday by the House Judiciary Committee, Rep. Jack Brooks reported.

Brooks, D-Tex., a member of the committee, said the measure would provide one additional judge for each of Texas' court

The additions would put the number of federal district judges in Texas to 22. Six would be in the northern district, 8 in the southern, 3 in the eastern and 5 in the western.

Brooks said the extra judgeships should relieve some of the crush

of the backlogged litigation in the courts. Under the bill as passed by the Senate, Texas would have six new judgeships. The House committee deleted one of two scheduled new judgeships for both the northern and eastern districts.

Kilgore wins award

WASHINGTON-Kilgore, Tex. was cited Tuesday for the 'highest degree of accomplishment shown by a city under 25,000" in a national cleanup contest sponsored by the National Congress of Beautification.

State gets financial aid

AUSTIN-State Department of Public Welfare officials got the money Tuesday to keep public welfare and medicaid payments at the present level at least through the state's financial year, ending Aug. 31.

"The transfer is in the process of being made now," Hugh Edburg, head of the accounting division of the state comptroller's department said Tuesday about the \$13.5 million transfer authorized last Friday by Gov. Preston Smith.

"This should last us about seven months, at least through the fiscal year, and maybe until next October or November," said Herbert C. Wilson, deputy state commissioner of public welfare, "unless of course, something unexpected happens."

Smith ordered the fund transfer to avoid announced cuts in welfare checks to Aid for Dependent Children and in medical assistance payments to those on welfare medicaid.

Veterans not taxed for drinks

AUSTIN-Members of fraternal and veteran organizations cannot be taxed on their drinks, as members of other private clubs are, but the clubs must pay a sales tax on the mix, beverage, ice or set-ups, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said Tuesday.

Martin's optinion was requested by Comptroller Robert S.

The club is the ultimate consumer for the ingredients of mixed drinks under the sales tax law, Martin said. In other private clubs, the member or his guest is the ultimate consumer and pays the tax.

State to dry up supply

AUSTIN - Texas' top elected officials announced Tuesday they have approved a statewide plan to dry up the supply of narcotics and illicit drugs.

The Texas Justice Council was designated as coordinator of the

"We have developed a good, solid plan for state leadership and action in curbing drug abuse in Texas. By means of this plan we sincerely believe that we can reduce the flow and the use of illicit narcotics," said a news release from Gov. Preston Smith's office.

Smith said the release was a joint statement from him, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and Speaker Gus Mutscher.

Apathy hinders free speech

Despite considerable publicity, Tech's Free Speech Movement is struggling through a stage of student apathy and administrative opposition.

The free speech controversy was set off last month when Tech administrators banned an issue of The Catalyst, a campus underground newspaper. Subsequent reaction to the banning resulted in the establishment of the Free Speech Committee by Student Association President Jay Thompson.

Headed by veteran Tech political figure Arthur Yarish and comprising a crosssection of students, the committee soon changed its name to the Committee for Freedom, Understanding, Communication and Knowledge.

ATTEMPTING TO broaden the interest SUB. in intellectual discussion and debate as well as freedom of speech, the committee has initiated a program of discussion of controversial issues, scheduled for 12:30 p.m. each Wednesday. The session is held in attention, but so far the crowds have been disappointing.

"The Administration tried to stick us behind the Union," said Yarish, "but that defeats the purpose of holding a discussion. It needs to be out where people can find it, so we moved to the front.

Next to student apathy, one of the biggest problems confronting speakers is their inability to be heard. Wind noise and the wide open nature of the area prevents communication. Speakers could not be heard at the fringes of even the small crowd which has gathered the past two weeks.

Repeated requests for amplification equipment have been denied by the administration on the grounds that the sound would disrupt classes. A selfcontained amplified podium purchased last year for the express purpose of use by student speakers has remained locked up. The only time amplification will be allowed, according to official policy, is if the discussion will be moved back behind the

"WE REALLY DO need some amplification if the Free Speech discussions are to be successful," said a member of the committee. Editorial Forum to reveal racism at Tech

The objective of the Race Forum is to inform the university of racial problems and conditions which exist — perhaps subtly — on the campus.

A panel, which is to discuss various aspects of racism, appears to be at least qualified enough to state and defend their viewpoints. The panel is also balanced enough to offer a varied opinion, and, from all appearances, the seminar will be well-handled.

In addition to the evening seminar session, programs in the afternoon will be designed to give additional insight to race queries. These programs will attempt to disseminate information, among other things, institutional racism and ghetto problems.

The questions about racism having been raised, and here are a few opinions about the condition at Tech.

Many students are racist. Perhaps more of the students are in this category, percentage wise, than the faculty. Although there definitely are racist faculty members, the problem may well be more prevalent among the student body.

The administration and athletic department has come under criticism for being "racist." Generally, the criticism has become less frequent and more unfounded. Both areas are making significant attempts to combat such tendencies within their realms.

Two things complicate the problem of ending racial inequalities at Tech. First, the trend across the nation seems to be to recruit the black man. The supply of qualified black people is limited, if for no other reason than that they are indeed numerically in the minority.

Second, whether it's in the student body or in the general populus of the land, race considerations are restricting change because the opinions of these groups trail years behind the "reformers" who seek true equality, but cannot reach it because the answer lies ultimately in the attitudes of the masses of people.

Therefore, programs such as those conducted by the Student Association and SOUL (Student Organization for Unity and Leadership) are significant because they represent attempts to inform the public — to let the public determine whether it is following the best course of action.
