Tax bill passes through Senate

AUSTIN (AP)-Texas senators tentatively passed a \$662.3 million tax package Wednesday after thwarting liberals time after time in their attempts to tack on additional business taxes.

Tentative approval came on a 16-14 vote, and it was obvious that 25 votes could not be raised to consider the proposal on final passage.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said it would come up again today.

The only money added to the tax bill on the floor was \$4 million from a 1/2-cent a gallon increase in the diesel fuel tax. The so-called 17-14 liberal majority

crumbled in the tax debate, which centered on efforts to enact for the first time a corporate profits tax.

The major test, to adopt a 5 per cent corporate tax, failed 16-15 on the mystifying vote switch of Sen. Lindley Beckworth of Gladewater.

But Beckworth was consistent later, voting against separate proposals to set up a 4, 3, 2 and 1 per cent corporate tax.

As it was tentatively passed, the Senate bill raises the sales tax from 3.25 per cent to 4 per cent for \$299 million, raises the tax on motor vehicles and rentals by 4 per cent for \$79.4 million, increase the franchise tax by \$1.25 for \$102.7 million, increase the cigarette tax 3 cents a pack for \$46.7 million, increase the gasoline tax 2 cents a gallon for \$102.2 million and hikes the beer tax from \$4.30 to \$6 a barrel for \$28.8 million.

The Senate rejected 18-12 an attempt to remove the beer tax increase, which was put on in committee.

Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston said

the tax package was a tax "on the poor, sick, lame, broke and hungry." He and Sen. Oscar Mauzy, Dallas, led

the liberals in zeroing in on business

Schwartz' proposal to raise the natural gas tax failed 22-9, and his proposal to hike the oil production tax was defeated 22-8. A gas pipeline tax by Mauzy was rejected 20-11.

Schwartz' effort to put banks under the franchise tax failed 20-7, and Sen. Bill Patman's effort to tax oyster shell 5 cents a cubic yard was defeated 20-11.

A final report to install a corporate profits tax-including a proposal to eliminate entirely the franchise tax was killed 23-8.

"This tax bill monstrosity is breathing very well," said Schwartz.

The Senate tax package was designed as an alternative to the \$524 million house proposal, which also included a sales tax increase to 4 per cent.

The trend was set from the first when Beckworth switched and voted against the 5 per cent corporate profits tax after passing up a chance a moment before to kill it.

Asked about his votes, Beckworth said, "I have the privilege to vote as I please. I

always have and I always will." He refused any other explanation and quickly left the Senate chamber.

Beckworth, 57, is a freshman senator but he was in Congress 24 years and reportedly wants to go back.

Schwartz told the Senate that if it adopted the corporate tax it would be the "second most significant tax change" since the general sales tax was approved after a bitter fight in 1961.

He said 44 other states already have a corporate profits tax.

At the proposed 5 per cent rate, Schwartz estimated the tax would raise \$358 million over two years. It was later estimated the net income from the tax would be \$171.8 million because Schwartz' amendment also proposed rubbing out a proposed franchise tax increase and cutting the franchise tax on Texas companies from \$3.25 to \$2 per \$1,000 of assets next year.

"It is the most equitable, the most fair, the most sensible tax in keeping with what our sister states have done," Mauzy

Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells opposed the proposal, saying a "corporate income tax and a personal income tax is two peas in the same pod . . . With one goes the other as day follows night."

"Texas is a great industrial state," said Creighton, "and one reason is because we've got a great industrial climate . . . with no corporate profits

Schwartz reminded his colleagues that Creighton sponsored the sules tax on food in 1969 - a proposal which cleared the Senate but was resoundingly beaten in the House after a taxpayers' minirevolt.

"Creighton thinks poor people go to sleep at night worrying if big business is happy," asserted Schwartz. "The business climate is so good in Texas because people are starving to death to keep it good."

The House passed, 135-7, and sent to the governor for signature a bill channeling \$82 million into aid to families with dependent children to head off a planned one-third cut in such benefits May 1.

Also approved was a Senate-passed bill requiring uniform accounting and reporting of all city, county and hospital district welfare expenditures. The measure must return to the Senate for approval of minor amendments.

The bill is a step toward getting credit for state welfare programs for local welfare expenditures.

Bailey appointed to assist Yoder

Housing Director Clifford Yoder has appointed an assistant director of housing and dining at Tech, thus forming

a completely new position for the school. Robert C. Bailey, who has spent 11 years in managerial and educational positions in the food and housing industry, will assume duties in the new position in June.

"Mr. Bailey will be a direct assistant to me," Yoder said, when contacted by the University Daily. "He will help in both management of the housing program and the food service."

BAILEY COMES TO Tech from his position of vice president and assistant general manager of Nobel, Inc., a company that distributes food, supplies and equipment in the Rocky Mountain

area from Montana to El Paso In 1960, after he attended college at Strayer College, Washington D.C., and completed a stint in the Navy, Bailey was appointed director of food service at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. There, he had administrative and operational responsbility for feeding 3,000 students in one dining hall.

In 1962, he accepted a position as manager of food service at Washington State University. He stayed with this institution for seven years with administrative and operational responsbility for dining hall activities.

Tech's Student Senate is expected to take action tonight on a resolution requesting a lottery system be installed

as part of the athletic seating program. If the Senate, which meets at 8 p.m. in Biology 101, passes the resolution, it will again endorse the lottery system and request the Athletic Council do everything possible to see that it is part of the seating program.

The Senate originally passed a threepart program calling for reserved seats, end zone seats and lottery seats. The program was approved by the students in a referendum last fall.

Also, the Senate is expected to discuss and possibly take action on an optional meal plan for commuter students. The bill calls for housing approval of meal tickets which would allow commuters to eat noon meals in dorm cafeterias.

-Comptroller Inefficiency Resolution. The resolution condemns the inefficiency of the comptroller's office and asks that the administration take steps to correct

-a bill to instruct the Secretary of the Student Association to send a copy of all legislation passed by the Senate to the Board of Regents, and

Antiwar action continues

Pressure prevails on Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)-Action in the antiwar movement outside Washington is bringing unexpected pressure to bear on congressmen.

Calls and letters are coming from the homefolks, prodded for the most part by Common Cause, the self-styled citizens' lobby headed by former Welfare Secretary John W. Gardner.

An aide to one of the congressmen sponsoring an end-the-war declaration had this to say about the surprise among some members of the House:

"Some of them have been calling us and saying 'Help! What have we done?' They say they have been getting letters and calls asking them to sign our statement and want to know what it's all about."

The statements the congressmen are hearing about are being circulated by bipartisan groups in the House and Senate endorsing full removal of the U.S.

military from Vietnam by the end of the

Due largely to Common Cause, many voters in the hinterlands knew about this congressional movement before their own congressmen did.

There are three of these end-the-war position statements being circulated-one bipartisan joint effort in the Senate and separate Democratic and Republican letters in the House.

Sponsors say their primary service will be to keep the swelling sentiment toward a legislated end to the war alive while bills to do this drag through the congressional machinery.

But Common Cause, which helped put together the statements and coordinate the campaign, thinks more of getting lawmakers committed by putting their names on record.

"We want the people back home to know how their congressmen stand on

this," said a Common Cause official. "A lot of them have been evading this, but sooner or later they're going to have to say whether they support this war or

Urged on by Common Cause, a lot of citizens are beginning to ask their congressmen just that question. Sponsors of the statements concede readily that this has brought them many signatures.

The big push is being made in the House where a Democratic letter of intent has 110 signatures.

While this still is somewhat distant from the 218 votes it would take to get war-ending legislation through the House, the sponsors say it is surprisingly high for this early in the fight in a body that has been traditionally reluctant to question the war.

Common Cause, which claims a membership of 140,100 launched the campaign with full-page advertisements in major newspapers in late March.

Students 21 years old with 96 hours or who will be married by June 1 automatically meet the requirements for off-campus living for 1971 Summer School and do not have to apply at the Student Life Office for permission, said Max Volcansek, Advisor for Men.

Tech Housing Policy requires that eligible students live in the residence halls unless they have been given permission to live off-campus by the Student Life Office.

Students will be given permission to

live off campus provided: 1. A student is married.

2. A student is 21 years old. 3. A student has completed 96 or more

semester hours. 4. A student is enrolled in Graduate

School. 5. A student on June 1 and continually after for the 1971 Summer Session is living in the established household of parents, or when financial hardship conditions exist, in the established household of a brother, sister, grandparents, an uncle or an aunt.

6. A student has served at least 18 months in the military service prior to June 1 as verified by a discharge cer-

7. A student has a health problem as verified only by the University Health Center which precludes living in the residence halls.

8. A student presents evidence of extreme financial hardship which will be intensified by his living in the residence

Any one of the eight exemption categories will be sufficient. These

exemptions also apply for the 1971-72 school year if the requirements are met before Aug. 25.

Evidence of falsification of information in connection with applications for offcampus housing verification is grounds for immediate suspension. All students must obtain permission to change residence from the Student Life Office prior to change of residence during the

ATLANTA (AP)-Slugging Hank Aaron of the Atlanta Braves became the third man in major league baseball history to reach the 600-home run mark for his career Tuesday night when he cracked his eighth of the season in a game against San Francisco.

Aaron, third on the all-time homer list behind the legendary Babe Ruth and Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants, connected in the third inning against Gaylor Perry with one man on base.

In the first inning, Aaron hammered the 542nd double of his career, tying him for eighth place on the lifetime list with Harry Heilman.

The Braves' aging right fielder, now in his 18th major league season, hit 38 homers last year, leaving him eight short of the 600 plateau.

Aaron's single best home run season was 1962 when he hit 45. He has reached 44 in four other seasons, the most recent being



Old faces in meet

DALLAS (Special)-In a situation that may be unprecedented in collegiate track, there's a possibility that not a single new champion will emerge from the 56th annual Southwest Conference track and field meet scheduled Friday and Saturday at College

The explanation is simple-at least one former champion returns in all 14 individual events and the winners of the 1970 relay races again return strong-and experienced-quartets.

In fact, there will be no less than 19 individuals cavorting on Kyle Field who can lay claim to 27 SWC championships.

The meet opens Friday with preliminaries and finals in all field events. Pole vault competition begins at 11 a.m., followed by other field events at 1 p.m. Preliminaries in running events start at 4 p.m. Friday, with running event finals beginning at 7 p.m. Satur-

BACK TO THE preponderance of title holders-17 past individual champions will be on hand, athletes who have won 21 titles between them in the past three years. Add in current performers who have run on winning relay teams in past SWC meets and the blue-ribbon roster swells to 19 athletes and 27 championships.

They date back to 1968, when freshmen were allowed to compete on the varsity level for the first time since World War II. Three freshmen who won titles that year will be back for one last fling-Dave Morton of Texas in the 440, Ronnie Mercer of Tech in the shot put and Ronnie Allen of Baylor in the 220.

Add those three events each also present two former SWC

Morton defeated Texas A&M's Curtis Mills in the quarter in the pari's freshman campaign in the SWC meet record time of 45.5 seconds. Mills has won the last two conference meets, with Morton finishing second both times, and the gifted Aggie from Lufkin holds the world record at 44.7.

Allen won the 220 in '68 and '69, then sat out last season as Mills claimed the title. Allen and Mills tied the conference record of 20.7 in their 1969 and '70 victories.

MERCER'S SHOT PUT title was taken away from the next year by another freshman standout, SMU's Sam Walker, as Mercer finished third. Walker skipped track last year for football spring training as Texas' Randy Nichols won the shot.

The 1969 SWC meet at Waco was the year of the freshman as five claimed championships. TCU's Carl Mills won the first of his two long jump titles. Baylor's Pete Morales won the three-mile, and three SMU freshman claimed titles-Stan Hill in the mile, Tebby Thames in the pole vault and Walker in the shot.

In last year's water-logged meet that was switched from Rice to San Jacinto College's all-weather track in Pasadena, ten underclassmen claimed championships.

Freshmen won two events, Mike Cronholm of Rice with a record 51.0 in the 440-yard intermediate hurdles and teammate Jim Pearce in the javelin.

REPEATERS IN THE '70 meet were Curtis Mills in the 440, A&M's Rockie Woods in the 100 and Carl Mills in the long jump.
