AN investigation made by the student publications at Texas university of what students really think of their professors started reverberations echoing throughout the contemporary collegrofessor, Is papers, a bit contemptuous, titled Your Grade their editorials, "What, That High? Again," Others wondered shyly what such a survey would uncover on their own campuses. A few others hitched up their galluses and tried to lay the qualifications that made up a good teacher. The Daily Maroon of the University of Chicago laid down seven sensible requirements which The Toreador believes professors and instructors of Texas Tech should strive to obtain. Following are these requirements:

1. He must be thoroughly humane, which means that he must have a sympathetic understanding of the human personality, and must bear in mind that his responsibility is not to subjects but to human beings.

2. He must be a teacher, not a taskmaster.

3. His purpose must be to develop, not to indoctrinate.

4. He must have knowledge, not only in-

andoctrinate.
4. He must have knowledge, not only in-

5. He must be educated; he must see his specialty in the light of knowledge as a whole. A teacher who has no interest in subjects other than his own, or tends to belittle other subjects, is an ignoramus and a menace to students.

7. As far as possible he must not feed his students with rehashed mental food, but strive to send them to the springs of knowledge, to the great original minds of the ages, through whom they might be inspired with the spirit of knowledge, the spirit of searching and investigation.
