Cramming Or Studying?

The average student becomes unduly frightened, and the natural result is fren-side cramming during the last week of each semester. No thought is given to learning the course, but the uppermost desire is to study--which usually means to memorize - the answers to those questions which the instructor is most likely to ask. Of course, the principal blame lies in the faulty education system which places the premium upon grades rather than ac-tual learning, but the sensible student is the on who strives to acquire a general and practical knowledge of the course rather than a superficial knowledge of those por-tions of the textbook which cover the pet subjects of the professor. The really sensible student has done at least a hord endering avera day through

necessary that each student go intogan ms notes and textbooks carefully and calmly without undue emphasis upon any definite portions of the course. If he does this, he will gain infinitely more than if he crams furiously on those principles which he con-sider the most likely to be included in the examination, for he will know the whole course in a fairly positive way, and will be more likely to pass the examination. The TOREADOR is not attempting to offer a short course in passing examinations. It is merely suggesting to negligent students that they do not cram; in other words, that they really study.
