TEXAS colleges should receive Congressman Martin Dies and his "American Bund" with open arms now that he has invaded Texas searching for un-American things.

Texans have never fully understood just what the furore is all about. Persecution of Shirley Temple and an attempted one on Mrs. Roosevelt smacks too much of the Inquisition to make them feel entirely satisfied. The interruption of private correspondence and wholesale requisitioning of telegrams is hardly reconcilible to the Texas spirit. But a close-up of the workings of the committee may throw some much-needed light on its activities and its underlying purposes.

#### Let's Get Friendly . . .

TECH has built up a reputation as a friendly campus. We are just a little proud of this, and on special occasions, when groups of outsiders visit us we do our best to demonstrate our friendliness. At other times, however, we lapse into indifference and even forget to speak to those we know whenever we pass. The custom of speaking to everyone we meet, which is a kind of traditidon on the campus, originated when Tech was a new and much smaller college. All the students knew each other and all were more or less on the same social level. As a school grows larger it invariably loses its friendliness because everyone cannot know everyone else, and one neglects to greet strangers. Also, a slight class distinction is certain to come with larger enrollment.

#### Audit The Books . . .

N several of the classes, instructors charge students a small fee to use books in the library. Instead of buying a text book, the student pays the instructor a dollar or dollar and a half and he in turn buys books for that particular course. These books are placed in the library for present students and students to come.

The object of the whole thing is gratifying, for instead of buying a four or five dollar book, a student pays the professor the small fee and has access to the book or books needed for that course.

Several complaints have arisen from this practice. No check has been made to ascertain whether all the money is paid out for books, but students have at times been professor, but students have at times been professor the placement of this money. It would be very easy to find out just how much has been placed at the disposal of the students, but this might cause a good deal of trouble and maybe embarrassment to particular persons.

A better plan that might be suggested would be for the instructor to hand in a list of the students who are supposed to pay the fee to the business office and let them pay their money there. Then there would be no doubt in the minds of a few, and the same object would be accomplished in the end.

As long as there are people, there will be others doubting their honesty and integrity. To save embarrassment from either student of professor, the simplest way would be to let the business office handle all business matters and the professor handle the intellectual. Then no one would be blamed but the business office if the books failed to turn up.

A. WOODS, state superintendent of schools has recently announced a new radio program, dramatized and designed to supplement regular public school work, to be broadcast over the network 15 minutes a day for five days a week.

Under the present setup, the program is to be sponsored by the University of Texas, North Texas Teachers college and Texas State College for Women, with each taking time about in presenting the broadcast.

No other school or college was mentioned in the program. But as this is a statewide program and has the interest of the state as a whole, more schools should be allowed to participate in the presentation.

More especially does this concern Texas Tech, the only college of note on the western side of the state. Tech has the third largest enrollment and reaches a wider area, consequently it could do a lot of good in this movement.

To say that Tech does not have the equipment to present a program is idle folly. Tech has its own radio class which is taught the intricacies of radio, radio script writing and radio presentation. The local station, which is always glad to help the college in any way, is a member of the state network and could furnish their facilities for the program. As the program does concern education in the elementary, junior and senior high education, Tech would not be hindered in the least here. She has one of the best education departments in the state and any knowledge concerning the program's purpose would not be lacking. A statewide institution like this should have the whole of the state at heart. All colleges prepared to do work of this nature should be given a chance to do their part in this new form of education. Discrimination against some colleges as the present setup seems to, will cause dissension among other schools and the whole project will be losing its objective—the democratic support of state agencies in education.

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
