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Orientation Classes Show Need For Improvement With Outlined Course

AS pointed out in an editorial early this year, there is a need for improvement in the manner of handling orientation at the older. Thus far, as in past years, orien-tation continues to be little more than some indefinite something attempting to fill a more indefinite something attempting to fill a more startifice other courses to teach orientation without further compensation. There is also a lack of any outlined course of study be-cause of the overburden of work placed on the shoulders of the instructors. Webster's dictionary defines orientation as that which enables one to acquire and subject. Adding to this, the college catalog

as that which enables one to acquire and hold the right mental attitude concerning a subject. Adding to this, the college catalog states that the course is designed to teach the relationship of the student to his college, the development of right habits of study, stu-dent's budgets of time and money, and sim-ple vocational guidance. A student's own words to the Toreador editor this week point out the weakness of our orientation classes. The sophomore re-marked: 'I don't know how to study so I am leaving school tomorrow.' This statement, just as others given by first year students during a recent survey, shows that orientation classes are not serving their purpose. But instead breed indolence because of the easi-ness of passing the course without studying. The Toreador recommends that the orientation courses be made into a series of fectures lasting three or four weeks at the be-ginning of each semester. The students would be dismissed after the material had been adequately covered, without any credit. As to the subject matter, the time would be well spent if freshme were acquainted with the use of the library, names and purposes are relieved of a burden, the students acquire mecessary information, the instructors are relieved of a burden, the students acquire ine for important subjects.



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
