In prison riot

Rockefeller defends Attica action

ATTICA, N.Y. (AP) - Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller says he stood behind the decision which sent state troopers storming into riot-wracked Attica prison, an assault which cost more than twoscore lives.

"I do not see how I could have done any differently," Rockefeller told a news conference in New York City on Wednesday.

Overnight, the governor received renewed support from President Nixon in the unleashing of the more than 1,000 state troopers. Wearing helmets and gas masks, they moved beneath a barrage of tear gas, firing shotguns and rifles until they quelled the four-day Attica riot the worst in an American prison in at least a generation.

Rockefeller added that he accepted "full responsibility" for the bloody Monday death toll - now set by the state **Corrections Department at nine hostages** and 32 convicts.

A 42nd fatality had occurred earlier.

The victim was a guard, William Quinn, 28, who died of wounds received in the first hours of the riot last week, when 1,200 Attica inmates rampaged through the prison, setting fires and taking hostages.

Quinn was buried during the day on a hillside overlooking the 40-year-old maximum security prison, which houses a total of 2,254 inmates. Sunny skies replaced gray, rain-laden coulds that had overhung the 54-acre prison compound for days.

Quinn's wife, Nancy, fought back tears as her husband's casket was lowered into the earth. Nearby, one of her women neighbors said: "they got too lenient with the inmates."

Originally, eight of the Attica hostages - guards and other prison employeswere said to have been killed by convicts who slit their throats with makeshift knives. A ninth hostage's death was attributed to gunfire.


However, a medical examiner's report 24 hours later ascribed the eight deaths to gunshot wounds, and said there was no indication of throat slashing on the bodies.

There was no immediate official explanation of the source of the gunfire which killed the hostages. But State **Corrections Commissioner Russell** Oswald admitted to newsmen that the throat slitting reports were false, and indicated the hostages could have been subjected to gunfire from state troopers. The hostage victims reportedly had been stripped of their own clothing and forced to don inmate garb. Oswald said this could have confused trooper marksmen.

And Rockefeller said that, in the hazy confusion of tear gas and gunfire at Cellblock D where the rioters made their last stand, "accidents can very well happen."

Remaining unanswered, however, were a number of questions - how the reports of throat slittings originated, the origin of false reports that some of the hostages were killed before the Monday assault, and that at least one had been castrated, and what were the precise instructions given the assault forces.

However, Hollis Chase, president of the guards union at Attica, stuck by the original version of the slayings and declared:

Smith announces teen voters

that Texas' newest enfranchised votersthe 18-20-year-old age group-may now register to vote in the county where they live, regardless of where their parents live.

The action came after Texas Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin agreed with a suit filed in a Sherman, Tex., federal court contesting the voter registration law requiring 18-20 year olds to vote in the same county as their parents.

Smith said the state will not fight the challenge of the new law.

The part of the law requiring unmarried voters under 21 to vote in their parents' county was put on registration bills by Reps. Gerhardt Schulle of San Marcos and Harold Davis of Austin. Both representatives said the reason was so that large numbers of college students could not "take over" local elections. The suit was filed by North Texas State

and the Young Democrat Clubs of Texas. Both students were refused by Denton county tax-assessor to be certified vboters because their parents live outside Denton County.

was graduated from high school in Denton and now attends North Texas State there. The law, as it states now, prohibited him from voting because his parents live in New Mexico.

Tonight last chance to buy, trade tickets

Tonight is the last night for students to purchase a lottery athletic seating ticket and to exchange reserved seats.

Sales were originally scheduled to continue through Friday, but the change was announced Wednesday by the Ticket Office through Bill Scott, Student Association President.

"There are about 1,200 end-zone lottery seats left," Scott said, "After tonight all the remaining seats will be date seats."

The ticket office will be open tonight from 6-9 p.m. for the purchase and exchange process.

"Lottery seats will be drawn Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Mesa Room of the University Center," Scott said.

A board has been placed in the University Center next to the Student Association for the buying or selling of seats. Forms to fill to buy or sell a seat are available in the Student Association office.

Chemist develops

pregnancy test

WASHINGTON (AP) - An Illinois chemist reported Sunday preliminary development of a simple, selfadministered saliva test that might help women achieve reliable birth control without use of The Pill or other artificial contraceptive methods.

Dr. Raymond O. Foster, a Ph. D., indicated the test might also provide a reliable back-up to the rhythm method of contraception, the only method sanctioned by the Roman Catholic Church, other than complete continence.

Foster said the test employs a strip of chemical sensitive tape a woman can hold in her mouth briefly each day. It is intended to predict the fertile period from one to five days in advance in a given month.

Foster, of Ottawa, Ill., told about it in a report made public by the American Chemical Society on the eve of its 162nd national meeting.

Charcoal Cody was originally owned by Sam Price of Lovington, New Mexico owner of a Lubbock western wear store. Charcoal was sired by Bill Cody, one of the top 11 horses in the states at one time.


