Rockefeller added that "full responsibility" for the blood Monday death toll - now set by the state Corrections Department at nine hostages
and 32 convicts. and 32 convicts.

The victim was a guard, William Quinn,
28, who died of wounds received in the first hours of the riot last week, when 1,200 Attica inmates rampaged through the prison, setting fires and taking hostages.
Quinn was buried during the day on hillside overlooking the 40 -year-old maximum security prison, which house a total of 2,254 inmates. Sunny skies replaced gray, rain-laden coulds that ha

contraceptive methods.

Dr. Raymond 0 . Foster, a Ph. D.,

ioned by the Roman Catholic Church, other than complete continence. Foster said the test employs a strip of chemical sensitive tape a woman can hold in her mouth briefly each day. It is intended to predict the fertile period given month.
