It is hardly necessary to point out how difficult it would be for two yell leaders, no matter how well drilled they may be, to lead a student body of this size in cheering at our athletic contests. True, the students possess two fine leaders in Arch Lamb and Paul Bowers but it is impossible for them to hold the attention of 2,000 students plus the large number of fans present outside the school enrollment.




