THE TOREADOR, student newspaper of Texas Technological college, is published Friday through out the summer on the campus of Texas Technolog ical college by students of the department of jour

1938. Old type faces and headline schedules went into discard under Henly's streamlining i-deas, which piloted The Tor-eador to its highest notch, All-American Pacemaker. His pro-lific tirades against syphilis commanded wide campus at-tention, and his buoyant urg-ings did much to revive a lagg-ing campus spirit.

ing campus spirit. Another All-American award was earned by Earnest Joiner and his 1939 staff, the first time that All-American ratings had come to The Toreador in successive years. Joiner waged a fight against the ban of cen-sorship and suggested school improvements. "God bless a milk cow," said Ed Kidd, and proceeded to join the marines. An obstinate sin-us forced Ed to relinquish in January the editorship he had won in one of the campus' most torrid election battles. Bill Wood, news editor under Kidd, was appointed by the Publicat-ions committee to fill the un-expired term, and he was elect-ed without opposition to con-tinue through 1941-42 the work he began as second sem-ster editor the past year. Combined efforts of E.II and brought to The Toreador a-mer all-American certifi-cane rom the Associated Colle-giate Press. 




