Figures for years follow-ing gradually increased the total until the graport for the year 1937 presented the graport total of 40,300 of our neighbors and friends, who took their last automobile peace showed a grand total of 441,912, almost twice as great as the number of American soldiers killed in war during the same length of time. may strive, But aside from the immediate benefits the chapter will offer to band students, its installation is significant in that it is a distinctive honor for the college and it places the band on the map with other important college bands of the country. In the United States, there are only 32 chapters of the band fraternity, a small number considering the number of colleges that offer band training. In Texas, other great schools were seeking chapters and yet Tech was the first chosen for mem-bership.

Wiley, director who has steered the band through several successful years, who not only has the respect of members of his band but of hundreds of high school band aspirants of this section. He has not limited his work to campus curricular duties, nor even to campus duties plus band trips, but has spent many hours of his time help-to conduct band schools and in taking part in programs which gain credit for Tech. This week, the band is conducting its annual spring concert tour which will gain many friends for Tech. It is selected because it is composed of a well trained group of college bandsmen headed by an able director. bership.


