

Techsans Go Two For Three In Golden Gloves Jousts

Three Tech Boys Uphold Standard Of Tech Spirit

Three Tech entries battled in the finals of the Golden Glove tournament at the Cotton Club Friday night, gathering in two victorious knockouts and a hairline decision-lose.

Rhea "Fats" Mitchell re-annexed the heavyweight title that he first acquired in the 1939 tournament by a third round kayo of Lewy Cox. The Lockney sophomore, agile student, had the falls scrapper on the canvas twice in the second round but couldn't apply the "lights out" touch until midway in the third.

Jack Lovin, Lubbock freshman engineer (who isn't in school this semester), required only 34 seconds to hang a knockout on Walter Burgess of Hale Center and walk off with the middleweight crown. Lovin, tabbed as one of the most promising fighters in the Glove contests, had his man down for a six count almost before the echoes of the opening bell had died away, and applied a finisher in short order.

Lee Stuart, sophomore engineer from Fort Worth, dropped the lightweight finale to Alvin McCarty, Littlefield, by a very close decision. Stuart and McCarty struggled it out from the opening until the final bell in what was possibly the best battle of the night. Stuart showed himself the classier boxer but was found that a three-day "conditioning" process was somewhat insufficient for three rounds of rugged give-and-take. Despite his loss, Stuart was nominated by ringers as a fighter of much promise.

Mitchell and Lovin will fight in the state finals in Fort Worth this week. Mitchell drew a first round bye and will not answer the bell until Friday night, with his first opponent yet to be selected. Lovin is conceded a good chance of going far in the state meet.

Other Tech boxers who entered the district contests were Francis Hightower, Paul New, Hubert Richards, Finis "Fats" Jolly, Raymond Reed and Curtis Beck.

Before this trek, a home and home engagement with West Texas State Teachers College will be reeled off, probably during the latter part of March.

Home dual meets have also been scheduled with Hardin-Simmons, A C C and University of New Mexico after the Southwest tour. These affairs are tentatively arranged for the latter part of April and early May.

Prospective candidates looming as potential varsity material include Jack Lovelace, David Storey, Trevor Wolfe, Jack Shanks, Lloyd Brunson, and Jack Hightower. Lovelace, Storey, Wolfe and Hightower played the majority of the games in fall semester competition, but Shanks, Red Raider football and Lloyd Brunson, last year letterman will be out to get their share of honors this spring. Shanks, although not possessing a tennis build, evens the count with his admirable poise and determination to win. Brunson has developed from mediocre calibre to class by participating in various summer tournaments.

It appears that Lovelace will pull down the number one slot with Shanks and Storey close on his heels. Wolfe, Brunson and Hightower will sweat it out for the number four position.

Brunson may play in the number one doubles combination even if he fails to make one of the top four rungs on the singles ladder. Doubles play appears to be his specialty.

"None of the positions have yet been definitely filled. Practice, hard work and competition will give the final results," Coach Allen said.

He lettered four years in baseball, basketball and track and three years in football during his high school days. In his junior year he was captain of both the basketball and baseball teams. He made all-district guard in basketball his junior year and led the district in batting in baseball the same year. He was given an award for outstanding play in basketball and football his senior year and was secretary of that class.

Considered U. T. Career He seriously considered playing baseball at The University of Texas under Uncle Billy Ditch and received an offer to play baseball at Texas Christian university, before deciding to come to Tech. Coach Earl Huffman, who also calls Grapevine home was the main factor in influencing Scott to come to Tech for football reasons.

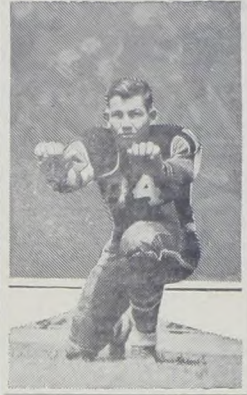

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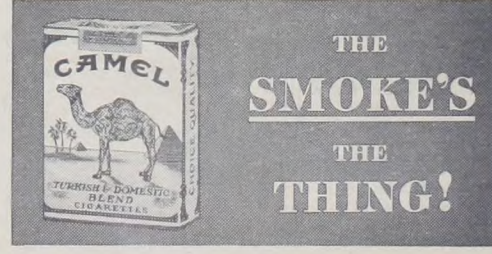
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Silver Key Rush Social Scheduled Thursday

Dr. C. B. Qualia, head of the department of foreign languages, has received a letter from Thomas M.
