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

Regular students who, because of selective service, wish to complete their college work before having to go to the army.

PROGRAM OF WORK

ARTS AND SCIENCES

Departments offering courses are: Biology, Chemistry, Economics and Business Administration, Education and Psychology, English, For-eign Languages, Geology, Government, History and Anthropology, Journalism, Mathematics, Music, Band, Philosophy and Sociology, Phy-sical Education, Physics, Speech. Specialized courses are offered in Guidance, Student Counseling, Visual Education, Radio Education, Workshop Techniques in Elemen-tary Education, Physical Education, and Public School Music.

ENGINEERING

Pre-Engineering and other freshmen who have not had Chemistry and Engineering Drawing may find it profitable to take these courses in the summer school. Courses in the Department of Architecture and Allied Arts for art teachers in the public schools and for regular students in the Depart-ment will be offered. The Civil Engineering Department is offering a course in *Traffic Safety* for public school teachers. Engineering Defense Courses in *Community and Camp Sanitation* and in *Engineering Drawing* will be offered. There are no fees for these courses and persons taking them will not be registered in the summer school.

HOME ECONOMICS

The Division of Home Economics will offer courses of special int-erest to supervisors of W.P.A., F.S.A., and N.Y.A., and to vocational homemaking teachers. Six-weeks courses and three-week courses will be offered. A student will take only on three-weeks course at a time. Three-Week Courses First Term—June 5 to June 24 Home Furnishing June 25 to July 15 Art Appreciation Second Term—July 15 to August 2 Food Preservation August 4 to August 2 Weaving Crafts Advanced undergraduate and graduate courses will be offered in all departments. Freshmen and sophomore courses will also be offered.

During the summer term graduate work may be pursued in all those departments which regularly offer graduate work. In addition, special work in Physical Education and in Band which may fulfill minor requirements for the Master's degree is offered during the summer.

AGRICULTURE

Instruction is available in each of the Departments in the Divis-ion of Agriculture. An intensive three-weeks course in Soil Conservation for full credit is available again during the first three weeks of the first term. As an aid to teachers in service five courses are offered in th Agricul-tural Departments during the last three weeks of the first term.
