APPEALS FOR CONCRETE TENNIS COURTS
To the Editor:
Texas Tech must bow her proud head to many
of her smaller rivals in one issue, without doubt.
Visitors to Tech are shocked to learn that the
third largest school in the state of Texas has
not a single hard surfaced tennis court. It
makes one wonder if we deserve to be the third
largest in the state when one remembers that
the University of Texas has more hard surfaced
courts than they know how to use.

The University has had so many cement
courts and well-worked, surfaced, clay courts
that now they are building them out of a rubber-composition which is supposed to be the last
word in tennis courts at the present time. It
seems that Tech is content with not having
even one hard surfaced cement court at the
cost of about five hundred dollars while the University must look around and build their courts
at the cost of not less than one thousand dollars
each.

each.

Of course Tech is not yet in the class of the University of Texas, the West Texas State Teachers college at Canyon, or Hardin-Simmons or ACC at Abliene. The West Texas State Teachers college at Canyon with an enrollment of about 1500 has at present four good cement courts, two of them enclosed by ten foot rock walls, and has been granted funds for two more. Hardin-Simmons, whom Tech would not condescend to play at football, now has three good cement courts and is building a fourth to be surfaced with crushed brick dust which is supposed to be excellent playing surface. ACC with an enrollment this term of 571, has a pair of very pretty cement courts laid out and used regularly.


