City councilmen discuss Chicano march, demands

The city council and representatives of the city government were shown a film Wednesday of Sunday's Chicano march.

Official reaction to the more than 30 demands of the Chicanos, which included a call for the ousting of police chief J.T. Alley, was

Acting City Manager N. B. McCullough said there had been no formal request by Chicano groups to see the city council.

"The march appeared to be very peaceful and it didn't seem to be an arrogant type of expression," said Mayor Jim Granberry. "I am sure Chief Alley would like to have all of his men have the highest standards and a sense of ethics.

"I imagine he has some men that perhaps may not conduct themselves properly at all times; this I find uncalled for and untolerable," Granberry said.

"There are some people who have been in Lubbock for many years who have a knowledge of criminology. They have said to me that at no time have they found Chief Alley to lie to them. When an inquiry is made into the police force about a problem they said he has always tried to find out the situation and rectify it," said Granberry.

"There is a very definite place for a human relations commission. Some police on the force evidently have been taught Chicanos prejudices and there is a problem here. It is unfortunate that gathered at Lubbock these policemen don't treat people like they would treat their not and do not now express my views. Baker said he thought Alley was doing his job and if the Chicanos have any charges against the police or Alley, he would like to see them. Baker also would like to see a human relations commission established, but the commission would not be used as a citizens' review board of the police department.

"The march was peaceful, but I don't believe the Chicanos got as many people out as they would have liked to have had," Tom Martin, city public information officer, said.

He said he personally disagreed with everything they said except that he would like to see a juvenile detention center established. Martin said the charges against Alley were totally false, and that the Chicanos obviously don't know the man or what a police officer has to do to get his job done.

Everyone arrested at the Fair Park Coliseum was charged, but some charges were reduced, Martin said.

There are presently 198 policemen on the force; four are Chicanos and three are Blacks. They are all very fine police officers, Martin said.

Councilman Morris W. Turner said, in a letter given to The University Daily, "the march was a basic expression of American democracy. The participants conducted themselves in an orderly manner and without incident," he said.

"The views and expressions projected by the marchers did charges and demands, but most heartedly agree with the right to "A commission such as this would certainly make this type of demonstrate peacefully and to make those demands known,"

> "In my opinion the Mexican-American Community represents a potential political force to be reckoned with in local affairs," he stated.



A city-wide attempt to raise relief money for nine million East Pakistani refugees begins today with a proclamation by Mayor James Granberry declaring "a weekend of concern for the people of East Pakistan."

The proclamation that will be issued at 10 a.m. today reads: "WHEREAS civil strife and natural disaster in East Pakistan have resulted in thousands of starved, devastated people and

"WHEREAS the people of Lubbock know personally the impact of disaster on a community "BE IT RESOLVED that the weekend of Nov. 12-14 be

declared a weekend of concern for the regugees of East Pakistan." The campaign is supported by the University Center, Student

Association and Campus Ministries. All donations will be sent to Oxfam-America and Project Inc., which are international relief organizations. A concert to raise funds will be at 8 p.m. today in the Wesley Foundation basement at 2450 15th St. Rev. Arthur Preisinger, of the Campus Ministries, will deliver an address. Rev. Preisinger

said, "a part, a large part, of our common humanity is slowly starving to death. We cannot allow that." The concert will feature a wide variety of American and East Indian music with Tech music students contributing to the program. Sitar music and songs of the Indian and Pakistani

culture will be presented by several international students. There will be no admission charge but contributions may be made at the concert.

There will also be a concert from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday in the University Center Ballroom at Tech. Folk and sitar music and a slide presentation of the refugees' plight will be included in the Monday concert.

Senate passes aid bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate passed Wednesday night a trimmed \$1.1-billion foreign economic aid bill while the House approved interim new life for foreign assistance.

By a vote of 61 to 23, the Senate passed its new bill after rejecting amendments increasing funds and easing lending restrictions. Action on military aid, the second half of the \$2.3billion package, is scheduled today.

The House rejected by a 175-34 vote an effort to limit its foreign aid action to military assistance by eliminating economic aid from a resolution temporarily continuing the program at current levels.

As the House moved toward the 8 p.m. vote, leaders urged impatient members against rewriting foreign assistance.

"It would be ridiculous to write a new foreign aid bill in this atmosphere," said House Appropriations Committee Chairman George H. Mahon, D-Tex.

The congressional snag over foreign aid results from Senate action Oct. 29 killing a bill authorizing continuation of the program.

"Nixon has occasionally kept his promises .. he has hired the handicapped," McKuen said. "Many people say I stay on Mr. Agnew's back. Heck, I wouldn't get that close. But I have come up with a way to remember the Vice President's name. I just remember that it rhymes with 'zero'."

McKuen read what he says is his most requested poem "Sloopy."

"I knew it; someone always asks for that. Critics say it is just about a man and a cat. But it means a little something different to each one that reads it."

McKuen, who refused an interview with any of the news media, said all his interviews are distorted.

"One lady wrote that she had talked with me in my house and no reporter has ever been in my house," he said. "I am always reading interviews with me that I had never met the person that interviewed me.

"Love is continually having to say you're sorry," McKuen said after a question from the audience. "Love changes every day with each person you know. Love is giving what you need to get. It usually overtakes you while you are running the other direction. "I don't like dishonesty in any form," he said. "It bugs critics

that I am honest and that people actually can understand what I write. I have written several books under another name and gotten three awards off one of them. The critics rave over some of them. I would tell you the assumed name, but I want a little more time for the critics to hang themselves good." Concerning organized religion, McKuen said he had been a

member of several religious bodies including Methodist, Catholic, Mormon, Chrisitan Science and Presbyterian. "Sure I believe in God, but I don't believe in the business that

organized religion has turned into. Every man has to find God in himself.

"I believe the laws governing marijuana are stupid," he said. "I don't think it should be legalized but the penalty changed to more like a traffic ticket. However, I don't think the laws can be too strict on the pushers. It should have restrictions similar to liquor laws.

"The easiest way to find yourself," McKuen said, "is to help somebody else up."

He stressed that research has increased and that legislators becoming knowledgeable in the areas of pollution







