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# Students Can Aid In Fight For Increased State Appropriations

Increased State Appropriations

WRITES Editor Ed Hodge in the Daily Texan columns: "The Forty-fifth Legislature is now gathered in biennial session, faced with a full and important calendar. Exercising the right of petition, every interest likely to be affected will be gathered. In the nation, as in the state, steel, wool shipping, veterans, labor, and every class of economic and social interest press vigorously their representations for or against legislation which touches their profits or desires."

Thus begins an urgent appeal by Editor Hodge for students themselves to assist in alligning the legislators in interests of Texas university. Gathered from his comment to enrollees in the Austin institution, we offer a suggestion and earnestly plead with Texas Tech students to heed and help their alma mater in securing aid from our law-making body.

Along with pari-mutual betting, social security, and taxation, the Legislature will consider the budget of Texas Tech. As yet on schemers in the business world, we students of the college have more at stake in the appropriations for Texas Tech than in any other public matter. The prestige and excellence of "the University of West Texas" vitally and actively concerns us. By terms of Tech's budget, our educational advantages are written.

UNQUESTIONABLY Texas Tech receives the widow's mite for operation in comparison with enrollment at other state institutions. There is no uncertainty about our problem of "poverty amidst plenty" as matriculation figures leap annually. This condition alone makes a sound and deserving case for much more money in Texas Tech's coffers.

But the college's facilities for pushing that case are inadequate. The men who do Texas Tech's asking find their hands tied with strong rope and a hangman's knot by limited resources. Tech's representatives cannot easily hire the more effective, though less savory, of lobbyists.

It's up to the students who can help tremendously—not in passing out tencent cigars, not in throwing Representative Jumping and Senator Sorghum a swanky hotel party, not in button-holing legislators—but by acquainting themselves with the severity of our financial problems and justice of cause, and making manifest campus feeling on the questions involved.

THE very least a student should do—and that a great aid—is to visualize a true picture of lack of adequate buildings, cut-rate instruction, and of size made humble by empty money vaults. Let there be no doubt in the minds of the members of the Forty-Ninth Legislature about student attitude in the matter. A stamp will carry your persuasions to his senator or representative. Information for such letters may be easily secured by reading The Toreador and interviewing administrative officials.

### **Determining Grades**

CURRENT among student topics of conversation during examination week, and continuing this semester with discussions of grades, is the method used by several faculty members in determining scholastic marks. After hearing some of the tales of woe, we readily agree with the complainers and side with them in raising their voices against such practices.

One student pointed out that under a certain member of the history department staff, the first test's grade is used as an indicator on other quizzes. "To prove this, I filled several sheets of paper with facts irrelevant to those asked on examination. To my surprise, I received the same grade that appeared on a previous exam," protests an ambitious student.

SUCH practice, besides showing indolence on the part of the faculty member, is unfair to both the student desiring to make good grades and the lazy, carefree enrollee who just wants to get by. It takes no genius to discover that the first test may find the student unprepared. Seeing his own fate, he spends long hours preparing for the next examination. After writing a complete and accurate discussion, he learns, to his surprise, that his grade remains the same. Resorting to his textbook, he knows positively that he knows positively that he made a better record. He overlooks the initial occurrence. But, lo and behold, it happens again. He is bewildered. He gives up, exclaiming "what's the use."

But turning through his notebook, we note that he failed to turn in the last and most important page that sums up the entire discussion. The professor had not read the paper close enough to discover absence of summary.

ANY WAY you look at the situation, it is injurious. The student gets the habit of slipping by courses without any preparation. When the time approaches for actual concentrated study, he is like a stranger in a West Texas sandstorm—completely lost. Allowing the student to slide through so easily breeds an attitude toward life's activities that kills ambition, thus stunning intellectual growth.

Often, too, the studious, sacrificing boy or girl "gets it in the neck." He or she deserves much higher marks but fate turns a withered face and an injustice occurs, tearing down desires of those who should have due and rightful consideration by all means.

Undoubtedly, every faculty member on the campus is either underpaid or not worth employment. But each of them should show they deserve more compensa-tion by satisfactory teaching methods and not perform duties in a slip-shod way.
