### Legislators Hold Fate Of West Texas Youth Today

THE fate of West Texas youth rests in the Texas Legislature's palm today. College officials label this twenty-fourth day of March as "the most important day

day of March as "the most important day in two years."

In Austin this afternoon Tech's representatives lay the cards on the table before the House Committee in the form of an appropriation bill, asking for additional funds with which to operate "The University of West Texas," an institution that is leaping upward in enrollment and accomplishment with the same impetus that marks the sudden outburst of Old Glory, National Yellowstone Park's ever-spouting geyser.

For months members of the Legisla-ture have read reams and reams of data showing Tech's urgent needs. Also their ears probably ache from hearing discussion centered about our considerate demands. A bulletin compiled by President Knapp and printed in the college shop shows at a glance the enormous expanse of the in-stitution.

stitution.

Of course, an okay by the House committee does not mean that Tech will get every cent appropriated by this group. The Senate must approve the allotment. A hearing before the Finance committee is scheduled Monday but Dr. Knapp was attempting Monday to have the conference arranged for today. Should these two committees report favorably on the appropriations bill, the state's chief executive, Jimmie Allred, must sign the provision before it is sanctioned.

It is useless to write paragraph after paragraph now to open the eyes of the lawmakers. In all probability they are well settled on one side of the fence. But in making a final plea, The Toreador asks the legislators to give considerable thought to a reasonable restoration of salaries for our faculty and staff, a reasonable increase in maintenance, and if possible, a Library building as a very minimum of our building needs.

Also the student newspaper must remind the Senate and Legislature that in their hands rest the fate of West Texas youth as far as educational facilities may be considered. Their action, in no small way, determines the future of West Texas citizens—by placing first class facilities at their door steps when otherwise it would be impossible for many to secure a college education.
