Voter deputies to help

Discussion yields plans for minority recruiting

A discussion following a brief talk Wednesday in the University Center resulted in plans for voter registration deputies to offer assistance in recruiting minority group voters.

The need for a more effective minority group voice in city government was discussed in the brief talk by T.J. Patterson, freshman Business Administration advisor.

The talk and subsequent discussion were the first in a series of programs planned by the Ideas and Issues Committee of the University Center.

The two-hour program included occasional heated discussion. The main topic of the discussion was the role of the poverty-stricken in city government but suppression and economical problems of Lubbock minorities were also discussed.

Describing the problem of minorities as economic, Patterson said that Lubbock is composed of the 'haves and the have-nots.' The 'have-nots,' he said, have failed to break away from the conditions society has taught them.

"The Man' has the poor people conditioned," Patterson said. The Man' is good at that."

The poor people of Lubbock should work together to get the type of representatives needed to overcome problems of minority groups, Patterson said.

"By splitting up," he said, "we won't travel as fast as we could. The poor man needs to say, "Man, I'm poor. We've got to at Black businesses.

nustle together.

"Poor people have got to start using 'the Man.' 'The Man' has been using us ...We've got enough bargaining power to get things coming our way," Patterson said.

A politician will come to the poor before elections, but that may be the last time the poor see him, he said.

Stressing that minority problems are economically based, Patterson said that election of someone representative of minorities is only a beginning.

"Then you've got to work on the economic aspects," he said.

Quincy White, one of the 23 persons attending the meeting, said, "the people with the money control this country, man, and you've got to deal with them."

John Fletcher, a voter registration deputy, said, "we want to know how to start. These kinds of discussions always talk about how things ought to be, but never about how to do it."

Patterson suggested that Fletcher and other interested persons volunteer manpower to organizations in the Black community. People can help by working through existing Black organizations that have asked for help, Patterson said.

"The problem in the past has been the paternalistic manner in which Whites have tried to help," Patterson said. 'It's time for Black people to think for themselves, not for whites to tell them what to think," he added.

Fletcher agreed to send letters, offering assistance in registering voters, to organizations in the Black community.

Patterson also suggested that concerned Whites spend money at Black businesses.

Laird denies military assignment racism

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird denied Wednesday a report of restrictions based on race in assignment of military personnel at foreign bases.

At the same time the congressional Black Caucus continued its unofficial hearings on what it calls "Racism in the Military." Rep. Parren J. Mitchell, D-Md., said Blacks at Ft. Meade in Maryland live in a "climate of intimidation and fear that was

almost impossible to gauge.

"The extent of racism in the military is so deep we cannot possibly cope with it," Mitchell said.

Rep. Ronald V. Dellums, D-Calif., chairman of the caucus, alleged earlier this week that an agreement between the United States and Iceland dating back to the Kennedy administration restricted the number of Black troops sent to Iceland.

"I have never authorized the issuance of any order or policy guidance restricting the assignment of any military personnel based on race, color or creed," Laird said. He added that if any instructions issued in previous administrations deny or limit equal opportunity, they were rescinded by the Human Goals Program.

Several black congressmen, members of the caucus, visited various military bases Monday.

Rep. Ralph H. Metcalfe, D-Ill., said he was shocked at the way Blacks were treated at the Great Lakes Naval Training

way Blacks were treated at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center near Chicago.

"If a conflict evolved between a White and a Black, the Black would receive the extreme punishment and the White would get off," said Metcalfe.

He said White servicemen viewed the Blacks on the base "with an air of suspicion.

"I don't want to become an alarmist," said Metcalfe, "but the situation is becoming explosive."

Rep. Charles B. Rangel, D-N.Y., who was at Ft. Bragg, N.C., said veterans returning home from Vietnam would be greeted with the sign: "Welcome to Fayetteville—Home of the Ku Klux Klan."

A group of eight Black officers from Ft. Devens in Massachusetts said bigotry has "gone underground and emerged covertly in thousands of subtle ways" in the military.

"If Black officers had the proper backing, 80 per cent of the racism in the military would not exist at the troop level," said Capt. Charlie Smith.

At Abilene High

Eleven injured in disturbance

ABILENE, Tex. (AP)Fighting broke out between White and Black pupils in the cafeteria and halls of Abilene High School Wednesday and 11 were treated for injuries.

School authorities said it was not known what touched off the fighting, which began during a mid-morning break.

Police estimated 30 to 40 pupils were involved. Three boys and eight girls were hurt. All but two of them were treated at the school clinic. The other two were taken by ambulance to doctors.

Several White parents hurried to the school and fetched their children home

Some of the Black pupils reportedly were angry over the arrest of a Black teen-ager by police during the weekend.

Police Chief Warren Dodson has conferred twice with Black leaders following two protest marches in the city Monday. About 80 demonstrators protested the arrest Sunday night of

Johnny Stevenson, 18, whom they alleged was beaten by Police Sgt. Marvin Sanders. Then about 500 Blacks attended a meeting Tuesday night.

Dodson says he has held an investigation into the arrest of Stevenson and plans to take no action against the serverent who

Dodson says he has held an investigation into the arrest of Stevenson and plans to take no action against the sergeant who took a leave of absence with pay for one day. It will be up to the court to decide if Stevenson committed any offense and should have been arrested, he said. Dodson has, however, asked the FBI to make its own inquiry into the incident.

Senate to consider office appointments

A bill giving the president of the Student Association (SA) authority to appoint a treasurer and secretary will be introduced at the Student Senate meeting at 8 p.m. today in lecture hall 7 of the BA Building.

The appointments would require two-thirds approval of the Senate. The bill would eliminate the elected positions of business manager and SA secretary. An appointed treasurer would conduct the duties of the business manager.

The full-time SA office secretary would assume the duties of the formerly elected SA secretary. The new secretary would receive an extra \$50 a month for the additional duties of recording the minutes of Senate meetings and for publishing the Senate Journal.

The bill will be introduced as a proposed amendment to the SA constitution. If passed by the Senate, the amendment will have to be approved by Tech students in a referendum.

Also to be introduced is a bill creating a commission designed to promote the appointment of a student to university boards of regents. The commission would attempt to make this appointment an issue in the forthcoming gubernatorial campaign. The commission would contact student leaders at other Texas universities and colleges to promote a state coordinated effort.

Another proposal to be introduced calls for the establishment of a public relations office in the Lubbock Police Department. If the proposal is approved by the Senate, the Senate would suggest the office formation to the city council. The proposal also names the goal of the office as a better relationship between police and all segments of the city population, regardless of origin, age, sex, income or position.

The Environmental Delegation Act also will be presented to the Senate. The act encouraged the SA president to appoint a delegate to attend a public hearing on Dec. 9, 10, and 11 in Austin on truck and auto emission control. The bill also proposes that the Senate allocate \$40 to defray the personal expenses of the delegate to the hearing. The delegate would be responsible for submitting a report to the Senate.

A bill to raise the SA allocation to MECHA from \$150 to \$400 will be presented. MECHA is an organization of Chicano students who tutor local grammar school pupils.

Charged with trying to sell children

Scoutmaster, companion held in Jacksonville jail

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A Boy Scoutmaster and a companion, charged with trying to sell an Oklahoma City woman's two small children for \$7,000 and a used car, were held without bond Wednesday in the Duval County Jail.

The men were identified as William O'Hara, 37, also known as Milford Bennett, and Robert Westenhaver, 22.

They were arrested after allegedly trying to make the deal with a police informer. The children, Theresa Ann Cox, 3, and her brother, Robert Donald Cox, 2, were in custody of a juvenile court after spending the night with the informer and his wife.

In Oklahoma City, authorities said Mrs. Cox reported that O'Hara and Westenhaver had planned a business trip to Tampa, Fla., and she told them, "I'm tired. Please take the children for a little change of scenery."

Police said Teresa first identified O'Hara as her father from a small, dim picture in a Jacksonville newspaper, but later in a police lineup could identify neither man as a relative.

The FBI said O'Hara and Westenhaver and their wives had been living with Mrs. Cox and her children and the full interrelationship of the group had not been established.

The three women were being questioned by police.
Police told this story of how the deal developed:

The informer, whose name was not disclosed, and his wife met O'Hara a year ago at the Duval County Fair in Jacksonville and told him they were considering adopting a couple of children.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — A Boy Scoutmaster and a Three weeks ago, O'Hara contacted the informer and told him he apanion, charged with trying to sell an Oklahoma City expected to have two children for sale in two or three weeks.

"The agent contacted us, then called O'Hara back to argue about the price," investigator W. E. Beacham said. "Monday, O'Hara called and said he was on the way. They got into Jacksonville and called the agent to say they had both children.

"They settled on a price of \$7,000 and a used car. Our big concern was to get hold of the kids, and that worked out perfectly. "O'Hara took the kids to the agent's house, got \$100 in marked bills as a binder on the deal, then left them with the agent's wife

when the agent took him to dinner.

"Once we had our hands on the children, we moved in and arrested Bennett at the restaurant and got Westenhaver at a

The children "were in kind of rough shape — hungry and dirty," Becham said. "The little boy had some cigarette burns on him and the little girl had some bruises."

In Oklahoma City, Mike Worley, who serves as liason between the troop and the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latterday Saints, said O'Hara had been working with the 22-member troop for about two months and was chosen scoutmaster a month ago.

Worley said O'Hara, a former Eagle Scout and a paratrooper in Korea, and his wife attended church regularly and helped keep the troop's financial records.

"He's tough on those boys," Worley said. "But he sets it up the way it should be set up. He makes use of the boys as leaders."

Wants athletic seating referendum declared null

EDITOR'S NOTE-The following letter was run in the UD Nov. 12. Due to production errors beyond the staff's control, the letter did not appear in its entirety. The letter is a copy of one sent to Gayle Snure, government operations and relations committee chairman

According to a notice in the University Daily of Nov. 8, polling places for the Nov. 10 Athletic Seating Referendum were to be established in various locations on campus, including the Law building.

Law School Senator Hac Brummett confirmed this, but the polling places were not established. The Law building is rather remotely located on campus, and it would place an unreasonable burden on law students to have to travel to the main campus in order to vote.

As members of the Student Association who were entitled to vote in the Athletic

Seating Referendum, we feel we were effectively disenfranchised by the failure of the Election Committee to establish a polling place in the Law building, as authorized by the Student Senate. Had we known that the polling place would not be established, we could have arranged to vote in another location. As it was, we relied on the published information and lost our opportunity to vote. We question the ability of the Election Committee to properly conduct such a referendum, if it is unable to meet the simple task of establishing the authorized polling

Since we were denied a reasonable opportunity to cast our ballots in this referendum and since the results have been made public, we feel that the referendum should be declared null and

void and that a new referendum should be scheduled immediately. To deny any qualified voter an opportunity to register his opinion should be grounds to invalidate the referendum. In view of the exceptionally light turnout in the referendum, the number of votes which were not cast at the Law School could conceivably have changed the outcome.

Thus, in the interests of fairness and justice, we must demand that the referendum of Nov. 10 be declared null and void and that a new one, with precautions to insure that it be properly conducted, be scheduled immediately. Failure to do this will necessitate our seeking injunctive relief in the University Supreme Court.

University of Texas

University of Arizona

Interest-free loans to students for abortions, such as those now available at the University of Maine and Duke University, are "way behond our present capabilities," according to Mike Foudy, a student senator and cosponsor of the University's birth control counseling

The loans, paid for by student fees at Duke, are available in amounts up to \$300 to all Duke University undergraduate females 18 years or older. The program costs each Duke student about eighty cents and is legally

University of Florida

The University of Florida Student Government (SG) officials are presently considering the hiring of a SG lawyer for students. Although the proposal has failed to be passed in the preceeding two student administrations, the fight is continuing.

Steve Uhfelder, last year's student body president said, "I read a lot about the idea of a SG attorney and felt it was a good idea. To my knowledge it had not been initiated at any other university."

Since his term as president, the idea has spread and more and more universities are providing for and hiring attorneys solely for their student bodies; the University of Texas, University of New Mexico, Colorado State University and the University of Oregon are just a few.

"I might be overestimating the job of such an attorney, but with the help of such a lawyer this university could solve most of its problems, Uhfelder said. Most of the major problems between the administration and the students could be resolved if there was someone from both sides who could sit down and discuss the problems on an equal time and equal basis. A SG attorney could help in this type of situation."

Some instances where the student attorney would be delegated duties be in the areas of student conduct. dormitory policies, consumer protection and landlord

On the opposite side of the fence, however, University of Florida President Stephen O'Connell said, "A SG attorney couldn't fulfill the needs of the students any more than a city can provide individual legal assistance to each of its citizens. It's impossible to handle the problems of 23,000 students."

No one denounces the fact that a Student Government attorney would be useful but there is some controversy as

to where the salary for the position would come from. Because of a more recent addition to the Student Government staff in the form of a business manager, funds credited to the SG have been somewhat diminished.

This, in addition to a ruling concerning "public funds" by the Florida State Legislature has made the possibility of getting a SG attorney questionable.

Asks, 'Should freshmen girls have curfew hours?'

Among many aspects of learning, college is supposed to teach a person responsibility. Unlike other Tech students, freshman girls are not allowed to assume all of the responsibilities of college life. Freshman girls may not make their own decisions as to whether they want a curfew or not; all freshman girls must have a curfew.

Eighteen is the legal age for a girl. An 18-year-old girl may vote, she may get married and in some states she may even

be allowed to drink legally - so why is it assumed that an 18-year-old girl is not mature enough to make her own decision concerning the hours she will keep at Texas Tech? If no curfew existed, I realize that some girls may keep extremely late hours every night and never complete all of their homework, but these girls would not last long at Tech anyway.

By the time a girl enters college she is old enough to make her own decision as to when she will come in at night. I think it should be up to a freshman girl and her parents as to whether she will have hours or not, just as the choice of the general permission card or the specific permission card is left up to the girl and her

I hope that in the future a better policy concerning the hours of freshmen women is adopted.
