## Court verifies equal-protection clause <br> \section*{WASHINGTON (AP) - In a landmark ruling the Suprem}

Court Monday unanimously barred arbitrary discrimi
against women by legislators everywhere in the nation. against women by legislators everywhere in the nation.
The startling decision, announced by Chiff Justice $W$ Burger, was the first by the high court cloaking women with the equal-protection clause of the Constitution, the basis for earlier rulings advancing the rights of Negroes,
Burger said legislatures may treat
