

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




"Nothing happened to me," said Burton Crossen, exarmy pilot of the 352nd Bomb Group of the veteran 16th Army Air force, who spent eight months overseas. All of this eight months service was spent flying the flak beaten sky, ways of Italy, Germany and France. He was stationed at Foor gia, Italy, Ist-Lt. Crossen work the ETO. Despite the fact that the losses of our planes were few, it was no fault of the Jerry anti-alrcraft gunners. There was plenty of flak covered country to fly over as the mission required flying via Austria and other enemy held territories. Burton says that the most thrill-ing part of the 11 hour mission was landing at Foggia, their home base, and hearing the pilots say. "We really did it! We flew to Germany and bombed Berlin!" And now, dear reader, can you imagine this nan Crossen saying. "Nothing real-ly happened, Joe. You know how it was in Italy-\_rain, mud, and Wops."
