Survey notes many miscellaneous complaints

a survey taken of Tech students concerning what they consider to be Tech's main problem. This article deals with miscellaneous topics brought up by the students.

What's a Lloyd M. Bentsen: ask Sen. Ralph Yarborough

Who is Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr.?

Who is this 49-year-old South Texas man who graduated from law school at 21, was elected county judge at 25. U.S. Congressman at 27 and now seeks a seat in the U.S. Senate?

Ask Ralph Yarborough. He knows.

The answer to that question and many more is what Lloyd Bentsen himself is trying to give Texas voters before the May 2 Democratic primary.

Bentsen is an old pro in politics from way back. He has never lost a political race and once won over the opposition of the famous Judge Pharr political machine of Duvall County.

Bentsen, who says he is a moderate. opens his speeches with a patriotic touch that has the little grey-haired ladies waving their flags and when he settles down to real issues he has the businessmen nodding in agreement and reaching for their

The biggest problem facing Bentsen, as is with most candidates opposing an incumbent, is that of name identification. The slender, deep-voiced native of Mission, Tex., strongly resembles actor James Stewart, not only in looks, but in his smile and mannerisms.

"I'm fairly widely known in the Rio Grande Valley," said Bentsen, who returned over the weekend from a campaign tour of North and East Texas. "but people in the top half of the state haven't heard of me

Editorial Get a commitment

As students enter the last few days before the Easter holidays, they should look around the campus and recognize the innumerable changes which have taken place here in the last two or three years.

Start with new buildings and notice the improvements (unless you're in the music department, in which case, you won't like what you see.) There's the new BA Building, Law Building, Chemistry Building addition, Museum, Biology Building and Art and Architecture. It's inconceivable that Tech could have operated without these buildings for as long as it did.

Second, notice the surprising number of outstanding people who have cast their lots with Tech during the last few years (unless you're Music Department Chairman Gene Hemmle and you see your best people begin to look elsewhere.) A few such outstanding people to become part of this institution include Dr. Henry Shine, Dr. John Buesseler, Dr. Jack Steele and Dr. Lorrin Kennamer. And the list could go on and on.

Third, notice the attitude of the other students in your department (unless you're in the music department, in which case you won't have to "notice" their attitudes - they'll be quite apparent.) More and more, students in growing departments and colleges are getting things done - like Future, Inc.

Finally, remember how things were three or four years ago (unless you're in the music department. There, you can still readily see how things looked in the good ole days.)

The point should be obvious. There has been dramatic growth at Tech and such improvements are needed for the music department. In the case of the music department, students should be working toward getting a commitment from Dr. Murray and/or the Board of Regents which would insure that construction of a new music building can now be a firm priority since much work has been done on other areas of the campus.
