# Books Of Early Century Revoke Cosmetic Usage

### West Discovers Uniquely Titled Volume In An Early Catalogue

Do not get the impression that people who preach against use of cosmetics have new-fangled ideas, because early as the beginning of the seventeenth century books were being written on the unlawfulness of this practice.

Looking through a catalogue, Miss Elizabeth H. West, librarian, found a unique-titled book that was published in England in the early seventeenth century on the use of cosmetics by people of that day.

"The Unlovelines of Lovelockes; or, A Summarie Discourse, proving: The Wearing, and nourishing of a Locke, or Lovelocke, to be altogether unseemly, and unlawful unto Christians. In which there are out of Fathers, Councils, and sundry Authors, and Historians, against likewise some passages collected Face-painting; wearing of Suppositions, Poudred, Frizled, or extraordinary long Haire; inordinate affectation of corporall Beautie; and Womens Mannish, Unnatural, Impudent, and unchristian cutting of their Haire; the Epidemicall Vanities, and Vices of our Age", is the title of the book.

The whole story is practically related in the title but many girls of today might get a good idea of what their forefathers thought about use of cosmetics and realize that their parents are not making up new "stuff" to preach to them about.

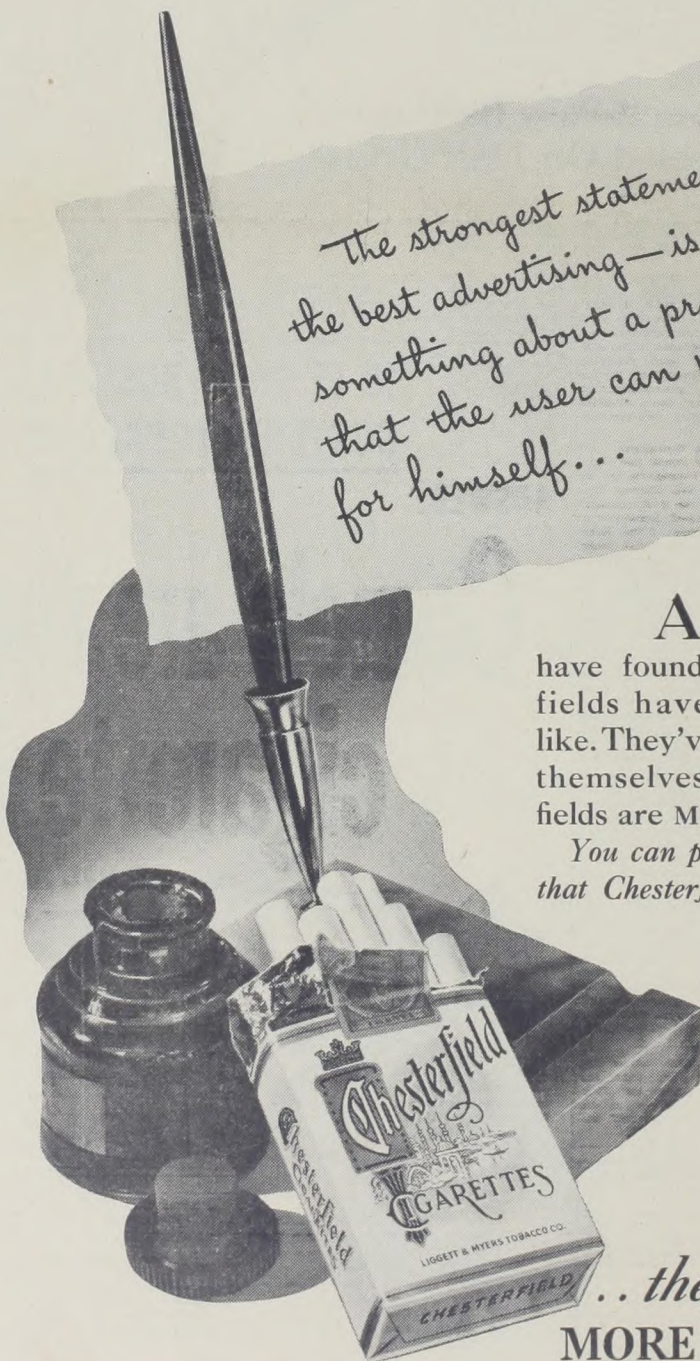
