# Student teachers have difficulty adjusting to being the teacher

A student teacher may be one of two things. He may be someone so scared and nervous about his new position that his class is able to do anything they please, or he may be so enthralled with his new sense of power that the class is scared to

Over 2000 Techsans are student teaching this semester, according to Nat Williams, director of student teaching. Some are teaching in Lubbock and some have been placed in schools in nearby towns. For all of them, taking the part of the teacher is quite a reversal of the role of student they have had for the last 15

Susan Brown, who is teaching sophomore English at Coronado High School, said she is having to adjust to having a different group of students each hour. "It takes a different personality to get through to each class.'

Gordon Downum, coordinator of student teaching for the Lubbock Independent School District, explained a recently innovated method called the "two-teacher approach" being used in the student teaching program. This approach allows for two teachers to work with one group of students, and allows the novice and the professional teacher to work more closely with each other.

Downum said he avoids the term "team-teaching" because the teachers rarely teach as team under the "twoteacher approach." He said usually one teacher will act as "lead" teacher while the other tutors individual students who need extra help, does clerical work or plans for the next lesson.

The two-teacher approach" also allows the student teacher to change classes for a day or two to gain a wider range of experience. Robbie Brewster's assignment is home economics at Muleshoe High School, but she has also taught basketball and judged a speech

Sometimes it is hard for the student teacher to relate as well as he would like. Barbara Hansen is teaching second grade at Bozeman Elementary School. "Many of the children have grown up speaking only Spanish, and there are definite problems because of this. They have trouble pronouncing words. It's also hard to explain some of the ideas we encounter, such as distance. They've never traveled, so it's hard for them to understand," she said.

Brewster grew up in Midland and admits there is a definite difference between her background and the smalltown rural background of the students she is teaching. However she said that this has not really presented any

Brewster said one of her problems is remembering that she can not talk to the high school students as if they were in college. "It's not hard to talk on their level; it's hard to remember to do it. I

guess I'd forgotten what a difference there is," she said.

Jody Simons began her student teaching in the third grade at Martin Elementary School, and last week she transferred to kindergarten. "What a difference," she said, "I think I prefer the older children because the class is more structured, but I'm getting used to this more each day."

None of the Techsans admitted to any major discipline difficulties. However, as one especially boisterous boy ran into the wall and put on an elaborate dying act, Simons sighed and just said, "that's our show-off." Hansen said no major problems have arisen in her classroom, but she does have two boys who "like to bother the girls."

Debra Dunlap is teaching algebra at Atkins Junior High and remarked that the first day she had the class alone, the students seemed happy because the "teacher" was out of the room. Brewster said her junior and senior students often have a haughty attitude, but this has not caused any serious problems.

While the Tech students feel the student teaching program is very worthwhile, there are improvements they

would like to see made. They agree more credit in semester hours should be given.

Gary Dewey, who is teaching history to Coronado High School juniors, thinks there should be some system for checking personality conflicts between student teacher and cooperating teacher. "I lucked out and got a teacher I really get along with, but I know this isn't always the case," he said.

Brewster is at her school all day, and Dewey agrees with her that this type of setup is preferable to teaching half a day and attending class the other half. Brewster said, "I can understand how hard it would be to be on a half-day schedule. Teaching really tires a person." Dewey feels that teaching all day would be more desirable because it would shorten the period for student teaching.

Dewey also said he thinks the supervisor's opinion carries too much weight in the evaluation system. "My supervisor has only been to my class once. The cooperating teacher's evaluation should count more."

"Student teaching is a big game, but it's worth it if you get a good situation,"

# Jury sentences Carver to five years on murder-without-malice conviction

After more than a year, the fate of Jeff Earl Carver was decided Friday.

An all-white, six-man, six-woman jury deliberated almost four hours before finding Carver guilty of murder without malice in the Sept. 9, 1971 shooting of a black classmate.

Carver, a 16-year-old white, stood calmly as Judge Howard Davison read the jury's verdict and announced that the maximum sentence of five years in a state penitentiary would be imposed.

Defense attorneys Clifford Brown and Tom Clinton, afterward, indicated that they intended to appeal the court's

Carver was convicted in the gunshot

slaying of Willie Ray Collier, 16, in the collapsing several hundred feet away vandalism, arson and sniper fire crowded hallway of Lubbock's Dunbar High School. Testimony indicated that Carver had been in a scuffle with Collier over cigarettes on the day of the shooting. Later, Collier reportedly cut Carver on the right arm with a razoredged box opener and threatened, "I'm

going to kill you white boy." Carver then was driven home by friends where he obtained a .22 calibre pistol and returned to Dunbar to look for Collier. Carver found Collier in a hallway between afternoon classes and approached him, slapping Collier on the shoulder with the barrel of the gun. Collier turned around and stepped backward before Carver fired.

Collier grabbed his side, turned and stumbled down the hall before finally

from the site of the shooting. Carver, the pistol dangling in his hand at his side, calmly walked out of the building. Collier was pronounced dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital.

Carver, accompanied by his parents, later turned himself into juvenile authorities that same afternoon.

That night, a crowd of more than 200 angry blacks marched on the Lubbock Police Department Building, demanding to see that Carver was in custody. Representatives of the croup were allowed to see Carver locked in a cell and were read a formal charge of murder with malice drawn up against him.

The crowd, still angry, marched through town, to predominantly-black East Lubbock. A three-day spree of

followed. Former Lubbock Mayor James Granberry ordered a dusk-to-dawn curfew on the town. Several arrests were made and one policeman was seriously wounded by a sniper.

During the last day of the trial, security measures were tightened considerably. Many sheriff's deputies and plain clothes policemen were standing in the halls, while outside the building several uniformed policemen were stationed in the vicinity of the courthouse. However, no incidents developed.

Carver remains free under bond pending formal sentencing by Judge Davison. Carver, under Texas law, may delay formal sentence delivery for 10 days after a verdict has been reached.

### McGovern hammers on end-the-war theme in effort to reverse trend of opinion polls By BROOKS JACKSON Instead he spoke off the cuff, accusing the President of ruling the nation "as a

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Attempting to turn the polls around in a final campaign drive, George McGovern hammered again Sunday on what has become his favorite vote-seeking theme: That President Nixon is deceiving the American people on his efforts to end the war in Vietnam.

At a reception for party and labor officials in St. Louis the Democratic presidential nominee threw away a speech in which he spoke of the "renewal of the presidency," and in which he promised to bring a new moral leadership to the nation if elected.

Roman emperor" by waging an undeclared war, by vetoing acts of Congress and by refusing to spend money appropriated by Congress for domestic programs.

The candidate announced last-minute plans for a nation-wide television appearance Sunday night to repeat his accusations.

McGovern appeared on nationwide television Thursday night, calling the onagain, off-again Vietnam peace settlement a "cruel political deception," designed to raise voters' hopes for peace in the week before election day.

The candidate headed from Missouri

for an airport rally in Moline, Ill., and evening rally stops in Brooklyn, the Bronx, and Queens in New York City.

Plans for today, the day before election, still were uncertain. But tentatively the candidate was scheduled to move west from New York making several campaign stops before reaching Sioux Falls, S.D., on election eve.

In St. Louis, McGovern was introduced by House Speaker Carl Albert from neighboring Oklahoma, Missouri Gov. Warren Hearns, and the state's senators, Stuart Symington, and McGovern's onetime running-mate, Thomas Eagleton.

Hearns, who had once balked at endorsing McGovern because he had dropped Eagleton as his runningmate, told the gathering of a few hundred persons, that he had already voted by absentee ballot and that "McGovern's leading Missouri one to nothing."

Eagleton corrected Hearns. He said he's voted, too, and the lead is two to

Eagleton said the McGovern campaign has picked up "growing momentum," and will crest election day.

Symington recalled that President Harry Truman, another Missourian, once said, "Everybody's against me but the people."

Texas voters going to the polls Nov. 7 will see the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) represented for the first time on a Texas general election ballot, with candidates in seven of 31 national and

According to Tech student Tim McGovern, SWP member, the SWP advocates common ownership of the nation's industries by the workers and control of production rates through "workers councils" operating from national to local levels.

The SWP's basic aims further include elimination of the wage system and creation of a world-wide classless

The SWP's November election platform calls for: -100 per cent taxation of all polluting

-abolishment of all abortion laws, -dismantlement of all U.S. foreign

military bases, -end of the wage-price freeze, -and change to a 30-hour work week

with 40 hours pay.

The SWP presidential candidate is Linda Jenness, active SWP member and women's libist. The Texas gubernational candidate is Debbie Leonard, and Richard Garcia is candidate for the U.S. Senate on the SWP ticket.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Negotiations between federal officials and Indians who seized the Bureau of Indian Affairs Building faltered Sunday amid indications the Indians are pulling in reinforcements and preparing physical resistance to any effort to remove them.

"I believe that this building is the only card we have," said Russell Means, one of the leaders of the American Indian Movement which spearheaded the seizure Thursday during opening activities of the Trail of Broken Treaties caravan.

A BIA official said only a handful of the 17 Indian negotiators showed up Sunday for discussions with five federal officials from Justice and Interior departments and the General Services Administration. And he said no real

negotiations had resumed by mid-

The Indians are demanding that Interior Secretary Rogers C. B. Morton, White House assistant John Ehrlichman and Budget Bureau executive Frank Carlucci replace lower-echelon officials in the talks.

"It looks bad," said Means, "We're dealing with flunkies. Everytime we ask them to make a decision they have to go out of the room to telephone someone else. That's one of the reasons I refused to go back today."

The BIA official said many of the demonstrators feel the government is interested in talking only about getting them to evacuate the building, not in any of their requests for substantial changes in the way Indians are treated by federal bureaucracy.

He said this has heightened the likelihood that they may not give up the housing are forthcoming, he said.

BIA employes were given another day off for today and a federal judge was reported to have put off until midday today a decision on permitting federal troops to rout some 200 Indians from the four-story building in downtown Washington.

The court has issued an injunction calling on the Indians to leave the building but they have defied it and thus far the judge has not ruled them in contempt.

Another court was to hear the Indians' arguments on permitting spiritual services at the graves of Indian war victims within Arlington National Cemetery. The Army said Wednesday it would not allow such services because it considers the caravan participants to be

Regardless of the ruling, veterans among the demonstrators and three medicine men have voted to go to Arlington anyway.

Earlier, many of the AIM leaders indicated that if the government would just come through with provision of adequate housing and food, that a joint negotiation board might carry on discussions about the other demands while the Indians evacuated the building.

At midday Sunday, however, Means said, "We are not going to vacate until we have a specific argreement. For myself, I'm pessimistic as to anybody on the other side reaching any agreement

whatever." Means said he thinks a fight with police or soldiers is almost inevitable, adding, "If it had not been election week I think the cops would already have ripped us

# Poll shows strong student support for Nixon

A poll conducted by four Tech government classes indicates Tech voters support the re-election of President Richard Nixon in even greater numbers than Lubbock voters do.

The poll of Tech students, including only registered voters, showed 76.6 per cent said they supported Nixon, 13.8 per cent said they supported McGovern, 8.4 per cent did not know and 1.2 per cent gave no response.

Lubbock registered voters gave McGovern support in the same percentage, 13.8 per cent. Nixon supporters numbered 71.4 per cent in the city; 12 per cent did not know and 2.8 per cent gave no response.

Students in Curtis Forsbach's two Government 231 classes and two of Dr. Roland Smith's advanced government classes telephoned a total of 395 in Lubbock and 458 at Tech between Sept. 27 and Oct. 11 to compile the survey. A Kish selection schedule was used to insure the random nature of selecting respondents

The percentages include only the registered voters, Forsbach said.

Forsbach said the survey results also show incumbent Senator John G. Tower "may be in deep trouble" in his race with Democrat Barefoot Sanders.

The survey showed 32.9 per cent of Tech registered voters support Sanders; 39.9 per cent favored Tower. Undecided voters made up 27.2 per cent of the total.

Lubbock registered voters also chose Tower over Sanders,

but the margin was not so slim: 41.5 per cent for Tower and 32.6 per cent for Sanders. Of the Lubbock citizens in the survey, 25.9 per cent said they did not know or gave no response.

Forsbach explained that the large margin of undecided voters showed voters are probably questioning support of incumbent Tower.

He also said the closeness of the race in Lubbock, a traditionally conservative area, indicates Tower, who is conservative, may be in even worse trouble in the rest of the state.

The survey indicated Democrat Dolph Briscoe is in good shape locally in his race for governor.

About half (54.4 per cent) of the Tech registered voters surveyed said they supported Briscoe. His nearest competitor for the student vote, Republican Hank Grover, garnered only 15.5 of the student support. And La Raza Unida candidate Ramsey Muniz, who has visited the Tech campus several times during the campaign, claimed only 4.1 per cent of the Tech vote. The undecided and other category in this race was 26 per cent.

Lubbock citizens surveyed included 53.2 per cent Briscoe supporters, 12.3 per cent Grover supporters and 3.4 per cent Muniz supporters. Those undecided or who gave no response comprise 31 per cent of those polled.

Forsbach explained that the method of polling tended to overemphasize the high income voter and downplay the minority vote. He said the telephone survey also tended to include more than the appropriate number of women, because women are more likely to be at home during the day. The margin of error in the poll is 5 per cent, he said.

The students also found that 91.5 per cent of Tech students said they were registered to vote, which Forsbach said was "a phenomenally high percentage, well over the nationwide average." Of the registered voters, 54.6 per cent said they were registered to vote in Lubbock county.

The survey results also show 19.7 per cent of Tech students labeled themselves Republicans, 25.1 per cent say they are Democrats and 49.6 say they are Independent.

When Independent voters were asked whether they leaned to the Republican or Democratic parties or were true independents, 21 per cent, or more than any other category, said they leaned to the Republican camp.

### Vets get pay increase

Early November has initiated a newly authorized increase in education assistance allowances for South Plains veterans attending school under the GI bill. The checks, which veterans will receive early this month will average about \$450, months of October and

November. The new law which passed Oct. 24, requires the increases to be retroactive to Sept. 1, providing for those who were enrolled in school in September. They will receive the difference between the old and new rates. The benefits will also be paid one month in advance instead of at the end of the month which explains the first check's twomonth allotment.

Examples of monthly payments which are available to veterans and have been increased under the new law full-time student (carrying 12 or The car rentals are available more hours) and a raise of \$40 (from \$108 - \$148) for a full-time student participating in apprenticeship or on-the-job-

The newly instituted measure also liberalizes rules on tutoring, making it easier to qualify for special allowances, gives wives, widows and children a broader base for choosing training programs under the dependents educational assistance program, enables women veterans to claim their husbands as dependents in order to obtain higher benefits on the same level as married veterans and allows widowers of female veterans to receive the same training rights as widows.

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

# Tech ruffles Rice 10-6; UT-Baylor steals spotlight

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# Miller Bonner Another McCutchen 'first'

Doug McCutchen climbed aboard the bus outside Rice Stadium nursing several bruises and a slight cold but awfully thankful for the narrow 10-6 Tech win over the Owls. Mc-Cutchen flopped his 5-11 205 pound frame into the first seat and as each member of the Raider team and coaching staff filed into the bus several comments such as "Great game. Doug" were aimed at the senior tailback from Bronte.

But Coach Jack Fligg, the offensive coordinator for the Techsans, gave Mc-Cutchen a little something other than verbal accolades. Fligg tossed the game ball into McCutchen's lap.

"You must have quite a collection of those things," quipped this scribe, sitting next to McCutchen.

"Naw, this is the first time I've got one," said Doug trying unsuccessfully to hold back a big smile and a little emotion.

McCutchen had just finished his best game of the '72 season against Rice, rushing for 116 yards in 21 tries. Most of the yardage had come in the second half when quarterback Joe Barnes was being kept under wraps due to a bruised side suffered in the initial half and speedy George Smith, the man splitting time with McCutchen at tailback, had also sustained a slight injury and watched the second half battles from the sidelines. The Raiders, hoping to keep the ball away from desperate Owl offense, turned to an old hand — McCutchen.

Noted for being a gutty running back but not too swift of foot, McCutchen followed his blocking beautifully and then lowered his head for crucial yardage, especially late in the game, against Rice. McCutchen's efforts. plus a key end zone interception by safety Greg Waters helped Tech stay in the Southwest Conference battle with the squeaky 10-6

McCutchen adds the Rice game ball to a list of "firsts" already accumulated as a Red Raider. In his first season on the varsity McCutchen welcomed a new head coach, Jim Carlen, with a 1,068 yard rushing effort — the first Techsan to go over the 1,000 step mark in a single year and replacing Donny Anderson as the leading Raider ball carrier over a one

Following Saturday's effort in Houston, McCutchen also threatens another Anderson record — the career rushing mark. Anderson finished with 2,280 yards to show for three years as a Red Raider. To date, McCutchen has totaled 2,143 steps only 138 yards shy of adding that record to his list of firsts and he has three more regularly scheduled games-TCU, Baylor and Arkansas - in which to

In fact, after this season McCutchen will lack owning only two individual Raider rushing marks. One, the longest run from scrimmage, is held by Anderson — a 90 yard jaunt against TCU in 1964. McCutchen's "fleet feet" have limited his longest run to only 38 steps. The second is the single game ball totin' mark currently held by Walter Schlinkman who gained 206 yards against Creighton in 1942. McCutchen is a close second with 204

Whether or not McCutchen gains the needed yardage for the records he does not hold is insignificant considering the feats already accomplished, especially for a "short, slow runningback" from the "big city" of Bronte.
