#### Livestock Experiment Is Subject For Thesis Graduate Student Tests Teachers Return

Economical Methods Of Feeding Lambs

An experiment expected to provide practical advice to farmers of the South Plains is the material being used by Merril Polson, graduate agriculture student, as the basis for a master's thesis.

One-hundred-twenty grade Rambouillet weather lambs are being used in the experiment by Polson, in an effort to determine ideal feeding rations for lambs in this sectioh. Divided into six groups of twenty each, the animals are being fed for a minimum period of ninety days, each group receiving a different variety of feed. At the end of the experiment cost of feeding each group and weight gained will be computed.


