**FOUR TECHNICAL COURSES ARE NOW OFFERED IN AGRICULTURAL FIELD; ANIMAL HUSBANDRY IS FEATURED**

About one hundred different individual students have been enrolled in the various subjects in the School of Agriculture at Tech this year and there have been about 400 students in all classes. About one-fourth of these are students from the Schools of Liberal Arts and Home Economics, while the rest are straight Agriculture students. With the great increase that has been made in the agricultural equipment this year a much larger attendance is anticipated in the School of Agriculture for next year.

There has been a long period of relatively unprofitable agriculture in the United States. This "agricultural depression," if it may be called that, has greatly reduced the interest in University grade of agricultural instruction and lessened the number of men interested in the study of the fundamentals of agriculture. This decrease in the number of agricultural students over the country as a whole makes the attendance of the first year of Tech very encouraging. The subjects these men desire to study indicate that they are in earnest and that they are capable of standing up to a very high grade of work. Another thing about the men in the first agricultural classes at Texas Tech is that they come from a very large part of Texas. In this respect the students in the School of Agriculture differ from the students in the average College, most of whom come from reasonably nearby locations. This would indicate that many of the agricultural students of Tech are here from northeast and central Texas, because they want a definite type of technical instruction and they recognize the fact that they cannot get it in some minor school, Normal school, or classical college near home. Agricultural courses offered in Texas Tech at the present time are for Freshman and Sophomore students only. Next year the Junior classes will be added. There are four technical courses now available. These are courses covering General Agriculture, Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, and Horticulture. In all of these courses a great deal of emphasis is put on fundamentals and a scientific basis is laid for the deal side of agricultural work. A man studying Horticulture or Crops for instance, takes three entire years of Biology. A man interested in animal feeding and nutrition must first study his chemistry and his Zoology. The man who is interested in irrigation is also taught dry farming, physics, and surveying, and etc.

Particularly great effort has been made to equip the Department of Animal Husbandry. The definite idea in view is that Texas is and always will be one of the major factors in the production of livestock in the United States. Animal Husbandry cannot be taught without animals and equipment. The College has an excellent basic equipment for instruction in dairy farming, poultry farming, swine, sheep and beef cattle farming and further additions of the very best stock available in this country and in Canada are being made. While west Texas conditions are particularly kept in view in this work, nevertheless the plans followed in the latter years of the students' course are designed here, as in other agricultural work to give one a very broad viewpoint, particularly in regard to marketing, business economics and the most advanced thought on the improvement of the breeds in which the student is most interested. There are a good many students in the School of Agriculture who are partially or wholly dependent on their own efforts in paying their expenses thru College. This is a very hopeful and modern situation. A man who desires to go to College can

usually find the means. It is not best that a student have to pay all of his own way, and this is particularly the case where technical instruction is desired, because in that kind of College work there is a great deal of so called "practice laboratory," and applied work which must be done at certain definite times.

Strong courses will be offered in the Junior and senior classes in grains, grain sorghums, and cotton. It is planned that the leading courses in the study of grain sorghum and cotton for the whole United States will be built up here at Tech, and once the students have received their fundamental training in crops, they will be encouraged to go deeply into the crops most important in this region. Those courses will be both in production and in breeding these typical Texas crops. The same general plan is found in Horticulture, and much emphasis will be placed on dry farming and supplemental irrigation for the raising of western fruit and vegetable crops.

As rapidly as possible courses dealing with farm machinery and agricultural economics will be built up. It being recognized that Agricultural students have neglected these subjects somewhat.

Students who intend to enroll in Agriculture in Texas Tech in the Fall of 1926 are urged to line up their courses and get in their credits as early as possible. This is always a good plan and is of considerable benefit to the student in getting started off well in the first weeks of College.

**Spanish Club Is Progressive; Many Members**

Spanish Architecture in the buildings of the College, Spanish names for organizations, Spanish title for the yearbook and for the College paper, Spanish influence in practically everything, this is Tech College. And in the vortex of this systematized whirl of the College life is an organization that embodies all of this, "El Capa Espada," the Spanish Club of the School.

The Spanish Club is composed of those students who are interested in the study of the language, customs and arts of the Spanish-speaking peoples. There are, among its members, both beginners and advanced students, this year, since there was mutual benefit in bringing together these classes, both for number and for the favor of those who are beginning to speak the language.

Elections in the Club are made on a basis of grades, primarily. The club has been exceptionally fortunate, however, this year, in that it has taken into its numbers honorary members from among the faculty of the College, and citizens of Lubbock, who have contributed generously of their talents along linguistic and artistic lines.

The Club was organized at the beginning of the School year, and has progressed since that time, so that its really best work has been done during the last months of the year. Of the officers, two who have been selected President of the Club have not been able to remain with the Club. Those now in office are: Vivian Burnin, President; C. W. Hallitt, Vice President; Fred Medlock, Secretary-Treasurer; Frances Smelser, Reporter. Offices are held, according to the constitution of the Club, during the entire year. Membership of the club is large, and the opportunity to put into practice the

theoretical side of the study of this most beautiful of languages is correspondingly excellent.

The programs which are given fortnightly consist of Spanish Music, discussion of Spanish literature, art, etc.; these programs are intended to bring before the student a visualization of the aesthetic and cultural life of the Spanish-speaking nations. The entire evening's program is conducted in Spanish and the students profit additionally by putting into practice their knowledge of the language.

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### BITTERNESS OF DISCOURAGEMENT

It very often happens that the student who devotes a great deal of his time to extra-curricular activities meets with appalling disappointment and discouragement, which always leaves a bitter taste. No doubt many students were disappointed because they were not selected to make the excursion in behalf of the institution. And it is probable that many were slighted. It is a difficult task to select fifty leading students from a group of 1,000, and that is the problem the committee on personnel was confronted with. One student made the confession that he was disappointed, making a statement like this:

"He who soars highest, falls hardest. So it was when the roster of boosters was posted. Having been worked to a lofty height by a friend who said that my name was being considered, I was eagerly planning to make the trip. At first I was indignant. I was angry. It seemed that I had done more than many students on the roster. However, I gathered my thoughts and resolved to keep them from my tongue. Later in the day I was able to reason better. The difficulty of selecting fifty out of 1,000 students occurred to me. I was then able to see that the representatives were fairly well chosen. Although there were a few students who had done very little to merit their trip, I noticed that the majority of them were leading in some activity. Self-honesty forced me to conclude that I was not a leader in the activities in which I was engaged."

It is believed that other disappointed students will arrive at the same conclusion after giving the matter due reflection.

### SPIRIT: THE SOUL OF A SCHOOL

So much has been said within the past few months about Tech spirit that there has been some comment in the direction that the thing is being over-talked. The Toreador has been a means of creating a great deal of agitation concerning the spirit desirable in the Tech, and it is of the opinion that the matter will never be over-talked in any educational institution. It is necessary to be continually talking and urging the matter of school spirit or else it dies. Since school spirit is the soul of the school, when it dies the best that is in the school dies with it. We don't think there is any danger of spirit dying in the Tech, but it should be kept to its highest point at all times.

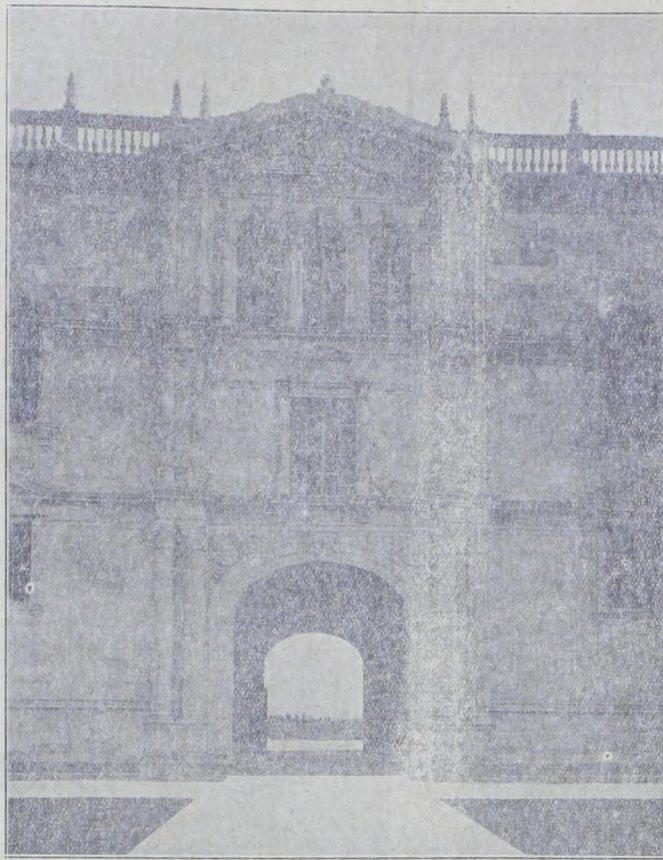

## THIRTY-THREE MEMBERS CONCERT BAND ARE AWARDED SWEATERS FOR FIRST YEAR'S SERVICES TO TECH

Resplendent in uniform-sweaters of Tech's own Scarlet and Black, the Concert Band members are bending every energy toward finishing up the current school year in a manner that would do credit to any institution.

Last Monday, thirty-three sweaters were awarded the band members who have been playing during the past term. These sweaters are as distinctive as they are appropriate. Scarlet jacket style, with "Texas Tech, '26" and a lyre worked artistically in black, they are the embodiment in a measure of the spirit of loyalty that has prevailed in the band itself since it was organized at the beginning of the fall term. The band members to whom the sweaters were awarded are paying for them themselves, both by individual subscription and by concert.

On the twenty-fourth of last month, a concert was given at Abilene, several miles north of Lubbock. At this time, a small amount of money was realized, but not enough that it was not necessary for more concerts to be given. Accordingly, it was decided to give home-folk a treat and a concert was given at the Tech pavilion Saturday evening, May 8. Tickets were underwritten by band members, printed through the courtesy of Barrier Bros., and a large number were sold at the very nominal price of fifteen cents. An excellent crowd heard the concert, and it did a great deal toward showing the people the people of Lubbock the fact that their college possesses a worthwhile band.

The band's program for the past year has been to appear whenever it was felt that it would be to advantage to have it present—which has been very frequent indeed. For a time, during the football season, they played at every game played by the Tech; and during other seasons, basketball, and football, they have been on hand time after time, supporting the home team and livening things up in general as no other institution of the school could do.

With instrumentation practically complete from the littlest to the biggest instruments, the band certainly makes music fly when it starts. Under the very able direction of Harry LeMaire, the band has grown wonderfully both in numbers, volume, and in quality of music. At present there are forty-two regular members, with

more than that present from time to time. Rehearsals are held on each Monday night, for two hours. During this time a real musical education is being gained by band members, and not only are standard marches played with zest and snap, but original, popular numbers and special are taken on the same basis.

The uniform of the Tech Concert Band when it is adopted, will be of Spanish style, in the colors of the school, Scarlet and Black. Spanish cavalier costume will form the motif, with red jackets and black trousers, with appropriate trimmings. This uniform will stand out clearly in any place, and will serve to make the band look its best as well as being heard as the best.

The service uniform that will be adopted very soon will probably be double. That is, with the Scarlet sweaters of the band now, black "sailor" trousers will be worn, with black caps, beanie with the scarlet. For other occasions, especially in hot weather, the uniform will be white duck trousers with the sweaters, with white caps. This latter has not yet been adopted, but probably will be at an early date.

The attitude of the band during the past year, with its achievements, might be labeled as "up and coming." During the next year, it will be still more. Whereas this year it started

from nothing at all, and has grown until it is now a real credit to the college, next year it may have this first year's growth as a basis for further swelling and expansion, with subsequent growth in quality of work done. This year, traditions have been entirely in the making, next year, and the years to come, the Concert Band will have its own history as an integral and individual part of the growth of the college.

The band is included in the scope of the Music Department of the College, this department being under the direction of Mr. W. J. Wagborne. Having thus a position of its own in the College, it may be assured that next year the band will be in an even better position. 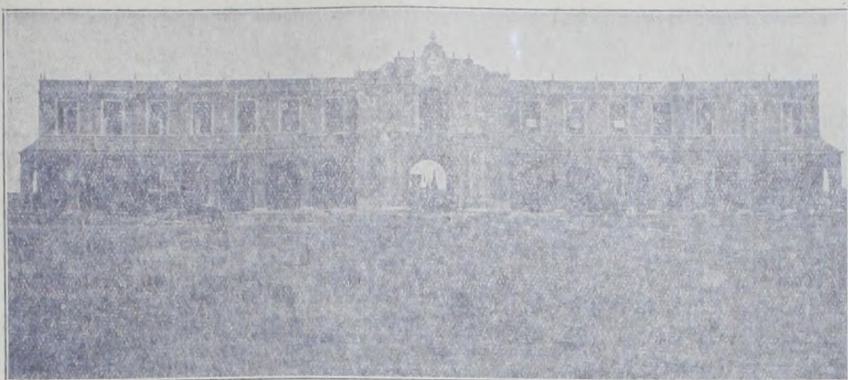

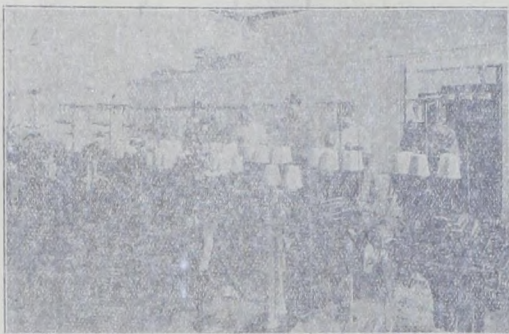

### SCHOOL OF HOME EC IS MODERN AND UP-TO-DATE

To the many friends of the Texas Technological College who have not become personally acquainted with the different schools of the College the School of Home Economics extends a cordial invitation to visit her splendid laboratories and observe the instructions in the department of food, clothing and design.

The equipment in each of the laboratories is of the most modern and efficient type, thereby giving the student the opportunity of learning to perform the duties of the household in the best and most practical way. The instruction in the different departments aims to give that knowledge and appreciation of the art and science of housekeeping which will thoroughly fit the students for home-making as well as for participation in the educational and industrial phases of home economics.

The enrollment for the current year is seventy-eight. In addition to this many students from the School of Liberal Arts are electing courses in the School of Home Economics. It is very probable that the enrollment for next year will double the present number, and with this fact in view the faculty will be increased in order to serve in the most acceptable manner the needs of the school.

The students in this School have shown themselves to be of a very high average. A good grade of scholarship has been generally maintained and a genuine spirit of college life and ability for leadership has been demonstrated in the work of the Home Economics Club. This is a student activity which was organized the second month of school and has been maintaining semi-monthly meetings throughout the year. The Club has established a loan fund scholarship for the use of a worthy student in the School of Home Economics. This scholarship is maintained by the proceeds from frequent benefits given by the Club.

The School of Home Economics is looking forward expectantly to her increasing responsibilities and opportunities for service to the community.

### No Corn Planted On Tech Farms

The students in Agriculture at Texas Tech in their introductory courses in crops received instruction in corn raising and rice and a number of other crops not grown in western Texas. In commenting on this method of instruction Dean Liddigh called attention to the fact that frequently we learn as much by the study of those things not our specialty as we would should we put in all of our time on the specialty in the early years of our college work.

One of the things about corn in western Texas that has been brought before the students is of interest to

the farmer as well. There have been experiments covering a period of some twenty years at four places in western Texas and these experiments show that Indian corn yields two-thirds as much per acre as does milo which is the premier summer grain crop of western Texas. Not only does corn make a lesser yield than grain sorghum but it is also subject to a greater irregularity in its yield. The largest yield of corn is recorded in western Texas has never approached the largest yield of grain sorghum, whereas in unfavorable years corn makes very small yields. The effect of this variable yield is that if we depended on corn for our grain and planted enough of it to take us through, in the face of unfavorable conditions, we would

have to plant three times as many acres of corn as we do of grain sorghum. With the above in mind it is easy to understand why Texas Tech is not planting any corn. Dean Liddigh says the farmer here who has everything just right might do well to plant a couple of acres of corn on rich sandy land and then plant fifty acres of the sorghums.

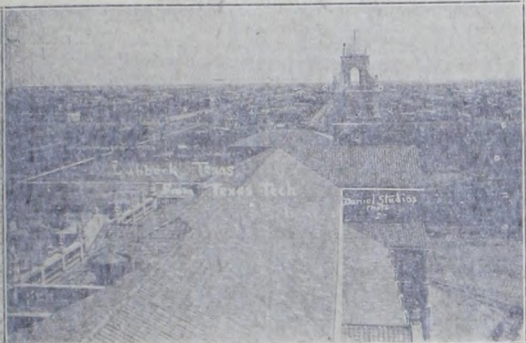

SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING IS ONE OF BIGGEST DIVISIONS IN TECH; ENROLLMENT LARGE FIRST YEAR

The importance of the School of Engineering in the Tech was stressed in the first section of the bill creating the institution, hence, the engineering building is the second largest building on the grounds despite the fact that only the first of the four units has been constructed. This unit has an approximate floor space of 27,000 square feet.

The engineering building as seen in the accompanying photograph was designed to house only the division of Textile Engineering. The first unit of the engineering building proper is expected to be built next year.

Enrollment in the "School of Engineering" this year was second to that of the School of Liberal Arts, and it is expected that it will increase in proportion for the ensuing year.

Dean Miller, of the School of Engineering, gives a summary of his school in the following light divisions: 1. Departments of School of Engineering:

- (1) Architecture and Architectural Engineering.
- (2) Civil Engineering.
- (3) Electrical Engineering.
- (4) Mechanical Engineering.
- (5) Textile Engineering.
- 2. Degrees Offered.
- (1) In the above five Departments.
- (2) In Geological Engineering.
- (3) Mechanical Engineering (Chemical Engineering Option).
- 3. Total Enrollment for year 1925-6, 246.
- 4. Per Centage Division of 1925-26 Enrollment Among Departments.
- (1) Architecture and Architectural Engineering 12 percent.
- (2) Civil Engineering 25 per cent.
- (3) Electrical Engineering 23 percent.
- (4) Mechanical Engineering 14 percent.
- (5) Textile Engineering 20 per cent.
- (6) Others 3 percent.
- 5. Courses Offered 1925-27.

All courses required in the Freshman, Sophomore, and Junior years for the above degrees.

A large part of the Freshman and Sophomore work is taught in the Administration Building.

At present all engineering subjects are taught in the Textile Engineering Building.

The Textile Engineering Building is 65 feet x 216 feet in size and has two stories. After 1926-27 it will be used only for Textile Engineering purposes.

It is expected that the 1927 Legislature will provide an Engineering Building to house the percent of our engineering students not taking Textile Engineering.

Equipment.

(1) All departments will be adequately equipped to teach all courses offered next year.

(2) A special appropriation of \$100,000.00 was made for Textile Engineering equipment by the 1925 Legislature. This department is now thoroughly equipped for its full four years of instruction. It is perhaps the most completely and modernly equipped department of its kind in the South.

5. Field for Graduates.  
For the past six years the average engineering student has had the faculty of several opportunities as soon as he has graduated.

An engineer's ultimate success depends in large measure on his personal qualities. Experience has shown that the average earnings of recent graduates is about \$4000.00 per year, after they have been out of school ten years.

Engineering is primarily a field of service to human society, but its followers earn substantial incomes.

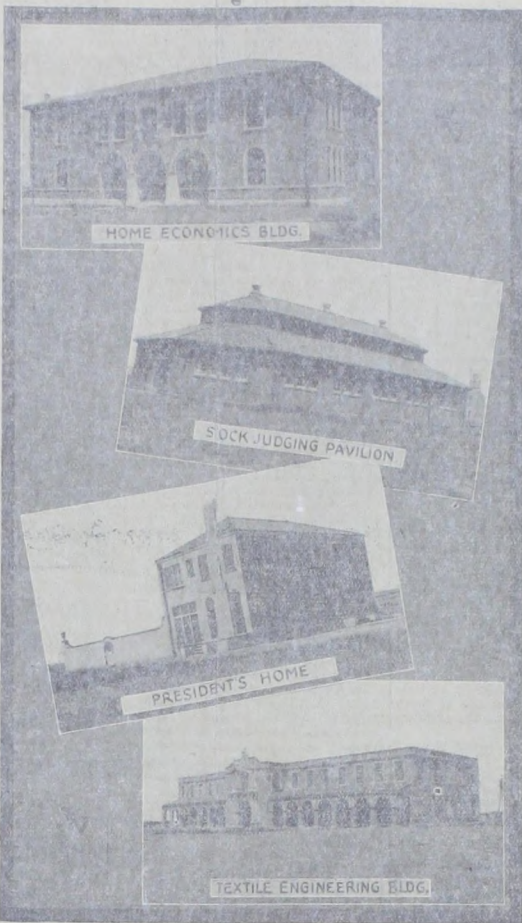
