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The Student Constitution

(Editor's note: In answer to numerous queries about the student constitution and with the idea in mind that there are a great number of stu-dents who are not familiar with our policies and problems of student government, we are at this time printing the document ver batim in order that no student may develop the wrong idea about the purpose of our governing body, as taken from the student's handbook which was printed and distributed to all students at the beginning of the fall semester of last year and amendments occuring since that date.)

PREAMBLE:-We, the students of Texas PREAMBLE: —We, the students of Texas Technological college, in order to be able to exercise the powers delegated to us by the college; to develop student gov-ship between the College Administration, the faculty and the Student Body; to rec-mend to the Administration and stu-dent organizations action which we deem advisable; to uphold student rights; to mote the highest ideals and best service to Texas Technological college; do hereby establish the following constitution: ARTICLE 1:=-Name .

The name of this organization shall be "The Student Association of Texas Tech-nological college."

ARTICLE 2:---Membership The membership of this organization shall consist of all undergradute students of Texas Technological college.

ARTICLE 3:-Meetings There shall be no regular meeting times, but the Association shall at all times be subject to the call of the President of the Student Body. Fifteen per cent of the membership shall constitute a quorum for transacting husiness

be subject to the call of the President of the Student Body. Fifteen per cent of the membership shall constitute a quorum for transacting business. ARTICLE 4:—Offheers Section 1:—The officers of this Asso-ciation shall be a President, a Vice-Pres-ident, and a Secretary-Treasurer, elected from the membership of the Association and shall be ex-officio chairman of the Student Council. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Student Association and shall be ex-officio chairman of the Student Council. The President shall rec-ommend such measures as he shall judge expedient, shall have the power to call special meetings of the Student Council and of the Association, shall see that the rules and regulations of the Association are faithfully executed, and shall appoint all committees of the Association or of the Council. The President shall perform any and all other duties properly incumbent on the chief of the Student Body. Section 3:—It shall be the duty of the President. The Vice-President shall be ex-officio a member of the Student Council. In case of a vacancy in the office of Pres-ident, the Vice-President shall assume the office and duties of President for the un-expired term. Section 4:—It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to keep a correct rec-ord of the proceedings of Student Asso-ciation and of the Student Council and to keep an account of all money belonging to the Association. On or before the last meeting of the school year, the Secretary-Treasurer shall present to the Council for auditing and publication an itemized ac-count of the receipts and disbursements made on behalf of the Student Association. The Secretary-Treasurer shall record all minutes and proceedings of Student Assoc-iation.

Section 5: —The officers of the Student Association shall assume the duties of of-fice upon the last day of the spring semes-ter of each year. Before entering upon the execution of their duties of office, the above officers shall take the following oath given by the retiring President of the Asso-ciation: "I do hereby solemnly swear (or af-

Dear Editor: Since I am not acquainted with the student government of Tech yet, I would like to have the following ten questions answered in this or current issues of The Toreador. Much to my disappointment, there are fewer students on this campus who know one line of the consti-tution of their student body than any school in which I have been a student heretofore. Without a doubt it was written for the student body as a whole, and a reasonable knowledge of its contents should be required of all students, even if freshmen had to study it in orientation classes.

Here are a few question to which I would like to know the answers: 1. Is the constitution written; preserved for the students or reserved to students? 2. Does it contain a bill of rights and if so, how many?

3. Is it the privelege of any student to have a copy of the document or is it supposed to be published?

 When an amendment or clause is added to the constitution, is there an election held and the student body allowed to vote on such measures?
 When was the present constitution written and who were its originators?

6. How many students are on the student council, how many from each class, how are they supposed to be elected, and must they maintain a certain standard, etc., to keep the position?

position? 7. Are class officers allowed to hold their positions the second semester, and are their grades supposed to be checked at the end of each semester?

8. How many students does it take to con-tute a quorum at a class meeting, and if a easure is voted upon, is it legal if a quorum negative is not present? 9. Should a student or group of students violate the constitution, who acts as a court in

violate the constitution, who are such case? 10. Is the student council supposed to be representative of the student body or are dorm residence students the only ones who are el-

Resunce students the only ones who are el-gible? How many students can answer these ques-tions? would be unfair I'm sure, but maybe the answers will give a few students a little more knowledge of Tech. There are more than ten questions I could ask similar to those listed above, but I'd rather save the space for answers to other questions from the student body. As a suggestion, why doesn't The Toreador sponsor a column on the editorial page each week of puesitons and answers about Tech. It is my belief that each student is entitled to equality as far as democracy is concerned, unless it is a laissez faire situar. Yours very truly.

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
