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

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

The two big guns in West Texas State's powerful ground attack last year will be back in action this fall. Ron Mills (top), White Deer halfback, was the team's top rusher with 569 yards and was named "most valuable" player in the Tangerine Bowl Jan. 1. Charlie Sanders, Gruver fullback, made All-Border Conference after leading the league in scoring with 72 points. Together, they gained 1055 net yards and scored 120 points.



West Texas State will bring a team to Jones Stadium Saturday loaded with returning lettermen who carried the Buffaloes to eight victories against two defeats and a berth in the Tangerine Bowl in 1956.

One of those eight wins was a 34-14 thrashing of the Red Raid-ers and Coach Frank Kimbrough's charges will be back for more of the same this time.

Halfback Mills, remembered by Tech fans for his 67-yard touch-down dash last year, was named the most valuable player in the West Texas 20-13 conquest of Misssippi Southern in the Tan-gerine Bowl.

Center Jerry Epps of Amarillo, tackle James Kauffman of Level-land and end Ken Ballard of Stin-nett are the other returning start-

Epps is being boomed for All-Conference honors this fall. He is moving from guard to center this year to replace the loss of Doug Higgins, second-team All-Confer-ence

Kauffman, the captain of the Buffs, will be a starter for the third straight year. Although quiet off the field he is always a rugged performer in action.

per game in '56. Kimbrough, launching his elev-enth season at West Texas, does have a few problems. One is re-placing quarterback Bubba Hill-man, a starter for four seasons. In last week's 20-7 win over McMur-ry the Buffs used junior Jack York at the quarterback spot the majority of the game. However, Mac Kehoe, a promising candi-date up from the freshman team, and senior Lindly Davis are ex-pected to give York a battle for the job.

Another problem is replacing several key linemen. Lost from last year's team are guard Joe Brooks and tackle Phil Wright, All-Border performers, and the above mentioned center Higgins.

Right now the line shapes up with Ballard and Tommy Coffey at ends; Harold Lamb and Kauff-man at tackles; Clarence Whitten-berg, Leon Manley or Jackle Whittat guards and Epps at cen-ter.

Coffey, a junior, has been an extra-point and kickoff specialist and is getting the call at left end this year. In the McMurry game he made several fine catches for good gains.

Whittenberg, a senior, has been moved over to guard from center, where he has played the past three seasons, and is expected to have his best year.

Manley and White are sopho-mores moving up from last year's freshman team where they show-ed considerable promise.

Lamb, anotthhr senior, is the associate captain. He is strongest on defense.

With these boys, most of whom have seen previous action, filling in the gaps the problems are get-ing smaller.

Ballard was last year's top pass receiver with eight passes for 125 yards and one TD. This is his sec-ond season as a starter.

In addition, an All-Border Con-ference starter on the 1953 Buff eleven, Bob Whelchel, is return-ing from military service to bolster an attack that averaged 30 points per game in '56.





West Texas will have 21 letter-men returning, including five starters. Back will be last year's top ground-gainers and scorers Charlie Sanders and Ron Mills.

Fullback Sanders of Gruver, who scored three touchdowns against Tech, was All-Border Con-ference in '56, leading the Border loop in scoring with 72 points.

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
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
