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

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

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

Those were the words of Dr. Ramon Kireilis as he appraised the new Natatorium-Gym on the Texas of the Natatorium-Gym will be opened in the first part of this month. "It will be open from 8 a.m." in the morning to 11 p.m. at night at least five days a week for sure, and perhaps on Saturday," the bead of the Physical Education Department continued. "The one-half million dollar pro-ject will boost the PE department and intramural program," Kireilis added. The swimming pool with 450 spectator seats, will have one and three meter diving boards and a ceiling height of 22 feet 6 inches. Water depth is 14 feet sloping up to 3 feet 6 inches.

Pool dimensions are 75 feet by 42 feet and there is a gutter all around the pool with adequate depth to provide proper sanita-tion and less splashing of water.

"I'm sure you have heard of a fast race track? Well; we have what is called a fast swimming pool," Kireilis said.

He went on to explain that the pool would be exceptionally fast because of the new type gut-ter system and lane markers in the water. Both of these features will make the water more calm, thus providing faster swimming.

The pool is the only facility for women in the natatorium, as they will occupy the old gym for other physical education classes. They will be permitted to use the pool as much as they desire, however.

as much as they desire, however. Kireilis said that several SWC dual meets will be held in the pool this year. He is making an effort to line the meets up with the basketball games dates. This will provide fans a chance to see a swimming meet in the after-noon and then the basketball game that night. ID cards will be good for admission to the dual meets.

The Natatorium will offer re-gular recreation swim hours with no charge to the student. Facul-ty members are urged to take part in the Natatorium-Gymna-sium activities when facilities are not being used by the students.

The gym area will include two 74 foot and one 94 foot basketball courts for the use of varsity, in-tranural teams, and men's phy-sical education classes.

Other facilities in the natator-ium are a locker room, check out room, drying room, staff of-fices, two classrooms and a wo-men's locker adjacent to the pool.

Gymnastic room, wrestling room, weight lifting room and handball courts were originally planned, but were cut out because of lack of funds, Kireilis said.

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
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
