# What Will the Verdict Be?

THE EXISTENCE of an important e-vent at Tech is at stake. This is the Var-sity Show—an annual event for the past 12 years.

12 years. The Varsity Show is in a perilous position because of incidents which have occurred during past year's perform-ances. These include ineligible students, grade-wise, on the cast, drinking back stage during rehearsals and property damage. The Tech Union, sponsor ty the Show last year and sponsor this year, has drawn up a set of rules to correct these incidents. Neverthelese the Welford

Nevertheless, the Welfare Commit-Nevertheless, the wertare commit-tee, an administrative-student commit-tee, is witholding sanction of the Varsity Show on the grounds of these incidents, pending student opinion regarding the continued existence of the Show.

This afternoon and tonight a survey will be taken in the dormitories to deter-mine opinion on whether or not the Var-sity Show should be continued. The sur-vey will be conducted by Tech Union Program Council members. Every 10th student, alphabetically, will be surveyed. This type survey has proven highly ef-

How does the Varsity Show operate? Students apply for administrative posi-tions or jobs such as director, producer or business manager. Or students try out for parts. Then, the production is the students'.

# Tech's Architectural Design Is Something To Be Proud Of

IS DOMECTION by JAMES HAMM (Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of a riddes explaining the different as-protes of Tech's buildings this article traces the history of the architectural expres-sion of tech. The tone of a campus—its bady best of the buildings and the relationship of the build-ings to open areas. The style of a college's build-ings should belend well with the surrounding country and the baaic design and colorig's should be similar in all buildings to achieve the greatest unity. The buildings can meet the spaced buildings are low and young looking, which blends well with the surrounding West Texas region.

Texas region. BASIC DESIGN, shape and coloring are similar in all build-ing since they are all con-structed from similar building A large campus—one of the

largest in the country-allows Tech to space its buildings fair-ly widely, which gives Tech an overall look of comfortable However, though the build-ings give an overall picture of being alike, they differ wide-

ly i

being alike, they differ wide-by in detail. "BALANCE IS achieved by contrast as well as by similari-ty," asserts Nolan Barrick, Tech's head architect. "A con-trolled variety lends interest with producing confusion." Some buildings have red lile roofs, while others are flat-topped. The Administration building has towers, and the other buildings do not. The col-or of the bricks used often differ slightly-from building to building, although the general tone of color remains fairly con-stant.

stant. SOME OF Tech's earliest buildings such as Chemistry, Administration and West Engi-neering, show the heavy use made of decorative features,

such as carved stone figures, in the early years of Tech. During recent years of tech has been a trend away from this heavy use of decorative features. This trend is in the most part due to the pressing need, caused by sharply in-creased enrollment, to divert all available building finds in-to as much floor space as possi-ble. Simplified and economical starways and less spacious halls are also the result of this trend.



# Tale of Two Cities!



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
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
