A doubtful compliment to the morals of American spouses was paid when the New York district attorney recently moved to probe into some 9,000 Manhattan divorces after smashing an alleged ring charged with faking adultry evidence for divorce trials

Charges in the New York cases were "described phony bed-room scenes, staged hotel dates, pre-arranged raids and paid-for-testimony." Ten attorneys, perhaps more, figured in cases in which "trumped-up" evidence was used to operate a "divorce mill'

Apparently drafters of New York law considered any mar-riage unbroken by adultry successful, for this is the only ground for divorce in the state. The fact that the D.A. is investigating consumated divorces, perhaps breaking up subsequent happy marriages, tends to prove, however, there is more to happy mar-riage than stringent divorce laws.

The problem of successful marriage comes home to all of us in this time when more people are marrying and marrying younger than ever before. And as colleges and universities are somewhat renowned as "marriage mills", it falls with heavy weight upon the shoulders of the college student.

Difficult divorce is not the answer, however, as the New York debauch indicates. The answer must come much sooner than that. The answer lies with a younger generation which is be-ginning to understand the problems of marriage before the step ginning is taken.

Yes, the divorce rate has risen, and with it, we believe we have seen signs of thoughtfulness and concern among the young people of today. 
