

#### Nothing But Praise ...

There can be nothing but praise for Texas Tech officials if the proposed addition of Pantex ordnance plant to the college es a reality.

\* Tentative plans call for Tech to assume operation of the vast plant from the War Assets administration by January 1. Pantex, located 17 miles northeast of Amarillo, which the government began construction of in 1942, will mean the valuable addition of some 17,000 acres of land and 414 buildings to Tech. Networks of railway and utility lines already are located on the property.

Tech must fulfill only two obligations: to maintain the s

Tech must fulfill only two obligations: to maintain the sev age disposal plant which serves a housing project occupying small portion of the land; to return the property to the govern ment in event of war. The government is satisfied that Tech is qualified to con duct research. The college's application for the property, aj proved by the United States Office of Education, detailed seve al types of experimentation, research, and training which Tex Tech expects to carry on at Pantex. A research project on whe poisoning is already in operation there, on the 8,500 acres lease by Tech in 1947.






