The announcement that a national bonus bill for veterans of World Wars I and II has
passed the veterans committee of the United passed the veterans committee of the United
States House of Representatives should make States House of Representatives should make
all of us stop and wonder just how far the well-wishers intend to carry the business of bonuses. An official of the Veterans administration has estimated this national proposal, which has the sanction of the powerful American vear, $\$ 1,000,000,000$ in the tenth year, and a peak of $\$ 6,500,000,000$ in 1989. Every veteran of both World Wars would be provided $\$ 90$ per month upon reaching the receive from $\$ 20$ to $\$ 90$ a month, the latter in case of total disability, with an additional $\$ 120$ a month to veterans requiring attendants. A wide variety of soldier bonus legislation via the constitutional amendment route awaits action in the Texas legislature.
