the Revolutionary War, editors began to print more and more
news criticizing public policies and public officials. The feel-
ing was so strong that at the timee the Declaration of Independ-
ence was drafted publishers demanded that some provision for
a free press be made in the document. Thomas Jefferson was
chiefly responsible for adding the press freedom clause.
Just what is freedon of the press? Most people believe it
to be the right of editors to criticize public policies and public
officials, , expose evil anywhere they find it. For awhile after
this new fredom was granted, many people abused it by print-
ing facts injurious to the character of individuals. Since that
time certain limitations have been placed upon the printing of
such news. This then is why freedom of the press cannot be so
easily defined.
Press freedom as we know it isn't a true freedom, but it
is true enough to criticize poor policy on the part of the govern-
ment. In fact, the only limitation is that placed on news which
is defamatory to the character of individuals.
Freedom of the press is a vital source of power in the
world today. Destroy this freedom and democracy is destroyed.
Suppression of the press would mean the rise of dictatorship.
The newspaper is the soul of a community Its purpose is to
present all sides of a question fairly and completely, praising or
criticizing as it sees fit.
The newspaper leads the way to progress in a community,
in both business and employment. National newspaper week,
Oct $1-8$, was established to make people aware of their news-
papers. Take a good look at your local newspaper and be proud
of it.
