



Morals Cleanup Is Needed

Since the recent action of the city, closing bawdy houses in the downtown area, students have seen an increasing influx of "girls" on College avenue

These girls who have begun frequenting places where the college student seeks enter-tainment and relaxation constitute, in our opinion, a disgrace to any business estab-lishment along which, or in which they operate.

That this condition does exist, is common knowledge among students who have been in a position to watch the invasion of the in a position to watch the invasion of the woman of the street. It has become increasing-ly difficult for the student, keeping his self respect, to go with his date to College avenue hangouts where they will be forced to rub shoulders with this rougher element.

shoulders with this rougher element. Whatever action may be necessary to banish this element from College avenue and the places where students are prone to con-gregate, we cannot say. We do know, however, that Tech students on the whole, come from good and reputable homes in communities that are noted for their devotion to morality. Regardless of how few of them come into con-thet with these individuals who nit their tact with these individuals, who ply their trade in the vicinity of the college, we owe it both to ourselves and to our parents to see that the area be cleared of every such per-

We do not intend to intimate that the situation has reached enormous proportions. It has not. Nor do we intend to imply that more than a very limited number of estab-lishments have fallen victims to the patron-age of these individuals. We do believe, how-wer, that the proprietors of these establish-ments could not but be aware that prostitutes at one time or another have asked for service at their counters and remained to ply their trade. We would not attempt to minimize the obvious in certain of the avenue businesses, but in one particular instance it has reached a stage where something should and must be done if the students of this college are to the source of the students of the source. and going uncurbed to any great extent. The recent crackdown in the city has forced the prostitute, to a degree, into the resi-dential areas where it is impossible for the police to keep track of individual cases. The migration of the students from residences close to the college into the dormitories has left possible vacancies which such individuals might occupy. Then, too, the Lubbock police force has no special vice officer who can be employed to cope with such a situation.

What the police department could do, given proper opportunity, remains to be seen. Any suspect may be picked up, fined and con-Any suspert may be picked up, thed and con-fined for medical examination if disease is believed to be present. After this time, the individual is released, returning to the police department only for periodical checks and

Whether prostitution as a practice can be Whether position as a plate to be our serious doubts, for it has survived many generations. We do believe that it can be forced from the area frequented by the students of Tech,

however

This first comes as the responsibility of the police department to do all in its power to remove these people. Secondly, it is the duty of the proprietor to refuse service to those who obviously practice prostitution. If he wishes to cater to the trade of the college student, this is the least that can be expected of him. If he refuses this expediency, then it is the duty of every student to avoid his place of business until such time as the above conditions be met.

If the business wishes to cater to the element in which the prostitute is allowed free rein, we suggest that responsible supporters of the school and residents of the community put such pressures as would be necessary to transfer the business to a more compatible area, allowing the location to pass into the hands of a management that can give the college student the atmosphere he deserves.
