## RAID FACULTY PARTY

### Ye Editor Found Killed By Axman

Merry Ball, editor-in-chief of the world famous EL CUSPIDOR, was found dead Thursday morning, the victim of a lurid ax-murder. Ball, who sweeps out the office semi-weekly, was discovered slumped over his typewriter in the modern air conditioned publication office with a gigantic ax embedded in the back of his crushed head. Several clues were found near the scene. Among them were four empty beer cans, an Esquire calendar, a box of Garrett snuff, an address book and a chewed up red pencil.

Boes sniffed the foul air which always courses through the offices, examined the ax in the back of Ball's head, made note of the clues, and then after a great deal of mathematical calculations, concluded that Ball was dead.

As the paper went to press, Boes had gone without "suppah" for three days. The staff had, in celebration drunk 147 toasts to the killer and EL CUSPIDOR had gained 6,573 new subscribers.

### Burleyque Veteran, Noted Novelist Presents Squawk Concert Monday

The renowned Ima Squawker will entertain students of Tech in a four hour concert in the Student Union building Monday night. The concert will start sometime between 8 and 12 p.m.

The black eyed, raven-haired, exotic beauty has been well-known in the entertainment world for the last 35 years. Senorita Squawker has had a long, bloody pull to the top but she has been acclaimed second only to Sally Rand.

#### Burleyque, Noted Novelist

The fiery dancer was born in Tombstone, Colorado, during the last days of the gold rush. She made her first appearance on the stage at the age of two. By the time she was five, her fame had spread and miners came from as far off as Rawhide Buttes, Wyo., to hear the little tyke sing.

#### Sings?

Senorita Squawker spent seven years in the Sing Sing Conservatory of Music, located in what is now Brooklyn, studying voice. Upon her graduation in 1912, she accepted a position with the "Hotsy Totsy Burleyque Vanities of 1913." She is the author of the best-selling novel "The C-String Murder," which was banned in Boston and netted Senorita Squawker \$31,000,000. Cooperating with her on her novel was the famous Hozelle Haddock.

Senorita Squawker lived in California for 27 years before she moved to Texas. "I theenk Texas iss thee mos wonderful place in the whole worl," she says. "California iss nothing compared to theeos mos beautiful country."

After her four year stay with the "Hotsy Totsy Burleyque Vanities," she became queen of the Iron Horseshoe, in New York. She left the Iron Horseshoe to become a resident of California in 1921. She remained in California until 1948 when she moved to Texas.

#### What She Sings?

She resides in a 19 room Spanish Hacienda in the desert country around Lubbock. Her beauty has not diminished since the days when she was queen of burleyque. Her temperament is just as tempered as ever, and residents of the south-

west are just as eager to see her now as they ever were.

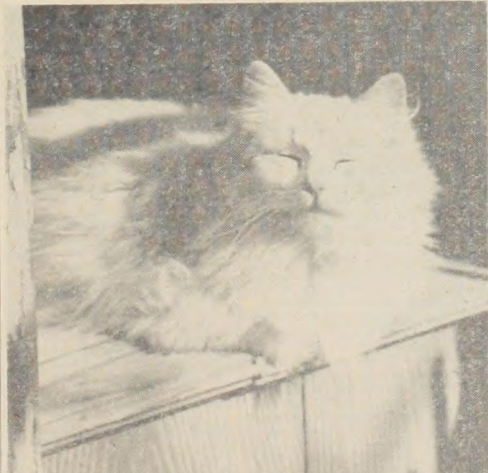
#### Swearing Yet!

## Scholastic Standards Raised To 3.5 Eliminate Loafing And Coffee Drinking

Clem W. Remnant, registrar, has announced new scholastic standards which must be met by all students planning to remain in school.

"These new scholastic standards were decided upon by a committee composed entirely of students. They are designed to eliminate loafing, as evidenced by the number of students found drinking coffee in the Green room any hour of the morning.

"By making students meet requirements which are a little harder we plan to cut down the amount of coffee-drinking and the amount of wear and tear on the Green room," said Remnant.

When asked for a statement on the new policy, Genal Ford, student chairman of the committee, said all students who intend to remain in Tech will be required to maintain a grade-point average of 3.5.

#### Coffee Cut

Also, we believe the conversation which is carried on over coffee is not of the highest quality, and this will be greatly cut down as a result of the new standards," continued Ford.

## Texas University Gets Half Profits Of Tech Oil Well

A 5,000 barrel-a-day oil well is in operation on the northeast corner of the campus according to W. L. Mucker, head of the petroleum engineering department. The 24 hour figure was calculated from a 113 hour flow.

Drilling of the well started March 10. Drillers reached a huge oil pool yesterday at 2,000 feet, and the department began the drilling for experimental purposes beyond recognition by the sudden spurt of oil and gas. The oil was brought under control, and is flowing at a steady rate. No casualties resulted from the blast.

"Half of the oil proceeds will be given to Texas university," a school official said. "Texas university has repeatedly sent money from its oil wells to Tech, and we couldn't afford not to return the favor."

With no hope or desire of striking oil, the petroleum engineering department began the drilling for experimentation. Students of oil production were to study dumping problems, top-hole temperatures and pressure measurements and other oil field techniques.

"Being several miles inland, it is doubtful that the federal government will try to secure the proceeds from the well under the title lands law," Willy Squirvin, geology professor, said.

Geologists say the well will produce indefinitely. It is believed that the oil was blown in with the sand over the past few millions of years and settled into one pool underneath the Tech campus.

A Jack-knife derrick with a regular rotary drilling unit and over 3,000 feet of pipe, donated by oil companies, was used in the drilling.

## Physics Freshmen To Use Cyclotrons

The cyclotrons, for use in atom-splitting, have been ordered from Montgomery-Moebeck and are expected to arrive the second Tuesday of next week, Mitt admitted.

Sophomores will be furnished individual geiger counters (purchased from Harry's junk shop for 89 cents per dozen) for use in testing the radio-activity of such elements as Arthur Godfrey and Jack Benny, Mitt said.

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# Missing Funds Lead To Investigation Of Members

## Lark, Gutters, Prigham, Treefield Face Charges In Misappropriation Of Money

Students have demanded an investigation of all Stupid Consul members, particularly those on the executive committee. For the past two weeks, rumors have been circulating that there has been a misappropriation of consul funds.

The charges were brought to a

head yesterday when M. L. Penetration, Tech trustee, revealed that at approximately \$1,900 was missing from the consul petty cash fund.

"After thoroughly investigating the matter, I have found that the stupid officers, namely Maggie Lark, Mushy Gutters, Claymond Prigham and Ellious Treefield, have been playing canasta with the money," stated Penetration.

### Now Is The Time

The money man also stated that only 10 cents remained of the original amount. At the first of the year, the fund contained \$2,000, he said. Of this amount, \$99.90 has been legally accounted for. This money has gone for buying consul members their allotted three cokes each per day as specified in the constitution, he concluded.

However, the members of the executive committee denied the charges that all the missing money went into wild canasta games. Accusations made by the officers brought the following facts to light:

Gutters has used almost \$150 for his weekend visits to Armadillo. He pointed with pride to the many attractions of this prairie village, and with even more pride he stated that \$20 of the amount had even been used to buy gas.

Miss Lark explained that she had never taken any money from the fund in an illegal manner, but had added to it instead. She stated that Tech should be proud of her because she had contributed more than \$7 to the fund. She explained that during all elections she accepted a penny per ballot to see that a particular candidate got elected. As confidential secretary of the organization, she dutifully turned over the whole amount to the fun, she said.

### Four Score And Seven

Both Treefield and Prigham admitted that they had used some of the money to buy presents. They stated that it was necessary in their positions as consul officers for them to entertain visiting notables and thought it was all right to use the money for such purposes. They figured that together they had probably used only \$500.

If these explanations are accepted by the students demanding an investigation, they still must face the fact that \$1,357 disappeared from the fund as a result of the canasta games. The executive committee members admitted that games were held every morning from 6 to 8 a.m. in the consul office. They explained that stakes were only one cent per point, and that they felt that canasta sharpened their wits and made them better qualified to fulfill their duties.

The Sublime court has considered the charges and given all consul members a vote of conscience.

## Aggie Trueheart Fulfills Life's Ambition; Dog Clinic Opens On Campus Next Week

Dr. Aggie Trueheart, eminent college psychologist, announced yesterday the establishment of a guidance center and consulting clinic on the campus for neurotic dogs.

Pointing out that the project is the realization of eight years' work, Doctor Trueheart stated that she first saw the need for such a clinic by observing her own 21 dachshunds at play. She observed that the dogs took sides in their private quarrels, but that one small puppy was always left out.

With the rehabilitation of this one dog as her goal, the doctor began the campaign which resulted in the establishment of the center. She has been hiring personnel for the clinic during the last month. When the clinic opened yesterday the staff included three trained psychologists and an educated police dog which will act as a receptionist to make the hapless dogs feel at home.

Doctor Trueheart is leading a drive to construct a model housing project for her charges. Plans now call for the buildings to be erected in the middle of the circle. The Student Council voted at its last regular meeting to donate the \$5,000 now in the Student Union building fund to the project. It was pointed out that a charitable project of this nature will be more beneficial to the average student than would a building for recreational purposes.

There are now 12 dogs enrolled at the clinic, Doctor Trueheart stated. A marked increase is expected in attendance now that the public knows of this service. All applications for consultations at the clinic must be made by the animal himself, she concluded.

## Body Of Chairman Found Near Tower Investigation Made

Human Wildes Cramp, chairman of the Tech English department, jumped or was shoved from the 125 foot water tower located on the west section of the campus. The actual time of descent is not known, but the body was found at 7:42 this morning, according to authorities.

Officials of the college expressed deep regret and concern over the tragic happening and have appointed the Home Economics division of the school to conduct an investigation. Maggie Squeaks is in charge.

Investigator Squeaks reported that a knife was found in Cramp's carcass and there was a slight chance he might have been murdered. One witness reported that he saw Cramp and a student chatting on the tower at approximately 7:30 this morning, but thought nothing about the incident until hearing of Cramp's untimely end. Miss Squeaks dismissed the witness with the statement that his testimony was irrelevant and unimportant. Several students and faculty members are under suspicion and the incident will be investigated further, she concluded.

Cramp, holder of a doctor's degree from Yale university, had been associated with Tech since 1930. He was known and loved by many students who fell, by accident, under his guiding and easy-grading hand. It is commonly accepted by students

privileges, there will also need to be changes in the hours for meals. The head dietitian said that breakfast will be served from 10:50 to 11:20 a.m. This will allow the women ample time to get up and make their 2 o'clock classes. A plan is underway, however, to do away with classes altogether for dormitory residents unless the student states specifically that she wants to attend classes when she registers.

Along with the change in meals, it was decided that the women be allowed to attend meals in their pajamas, robes and house shoes. Sunday meals are an exception to this rule. At this time, students may wear shorts, bathing suits or anything comfortable. The dietitians have arranged to leave the dining room open for mid-afternoon and night snacks. Light snacks will be brought around to the rooms after 12 each night. Mrs. Icicle is working on plans to have room service put in. This will eliminate the number of meals considerably, she said.

### Bar Will Open

Mrs. Dur-ner of Dorm IV has agreed to leave her apartment open at all hours for the students. The bar will be open at 2 p.m., she said. She also plans to have beer busts on the front lawn every Sunday afternoon, as she believes that her girls need more recreation. Mrs. Icicle in Dorm III has passed a rule that the spotlights will be turned off promptly at 9 each night to allow the women and their dates more privacy. Special provisions will be made for courting, she said.

All dorm mothers, faculty members and parents have agreed that the present system and that it has a drastic effect on their college education. It is hoped that the new changes will be for the good of the student. The board said that they knew women students would not take advantage of the new rules, although some of them are a bit lenient. If discontentment prevails in the future, it has been announced that dorm supervisors, counselors and rules will be done away with completely.

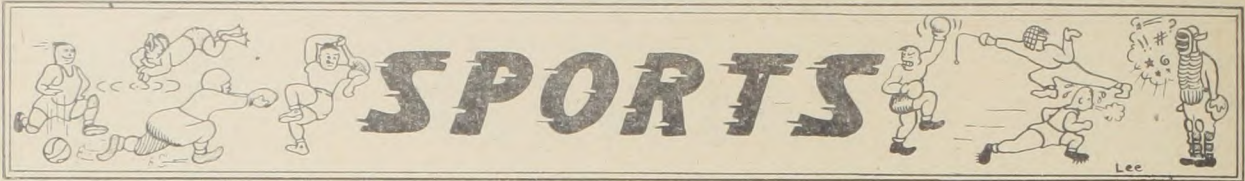

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# Fate Of Beloved Gymnasium Recounted By Doleful, Investigating Sports Scribe

Once upon a time there stood upon the Texas Tech campus a modest dun-colored stucco structure known as the Red Raider fieldhouse—but that was long ago. The edifice stood high in the regard of all who entered it, whether as a spectator or as an athlete, because it was a classic in simple, unpretentious architecture.

The gym was constructed on the lines of a large modern barn, which it actually had been until its latent potentialities were realized. "Take out the hay," Finch-penny Innings reportedly said, "and we will have stock in one of the best college fieldhouses on the South Plains." The feed was removed, sold to Chloe Hairless for dorm cereal, and one of the quickest large-scale conversion jobs in history went into the books.

The edifice, even though it existed in the distant past, had two conveniences that all modern buildings are proud to sport—windows and doors. The windows were many, small porthole-like openings which circumented the gymnasium between the roof and the top row of seats. These openings served as air conditioners for the field house and were quite adequate on days that were neither cold, hot, windy or wet. The doors, while not massive, were at least bulky and would permit two persons to enter or exit abreast, unless both happened to be

Another merit of the never-to-be-forgotten Tex gym was its strength. Spectators who came to see Red Raiders battle bitter rivals, had no fear of bringing the house down with applause. There were too many pillars supporting the roof. These supports, though definitely considered necessary even by present safety standards, may somewhat have hindered good observation by spectators. Many students, old Techsians say, came away from a thrilling sports fray thinking the game had been called off because they could not see any action on the hardwoods.

Backboards in the gymnasium, while not fancy, were at least backboards and could cause a ball thrown with sufficient force to bounce back approximately in the intended direction. These white wooden ball rebounders seemed somewhat of an innovation in this period-in-retrospect, because most college field houses were still using glass, or plastic oval shaped goal backgrounds.

The floor of the field house was in excellent shape—it was rectangular. Lines were painted here and there on its surface.

There might have been, however, more space. Five thousand students were hard pressed to engage in a required physical education course on its surface in one day, but most of them managed to squeeze in their specified routine.

An example of the one-time, play-a-day schedule is as follows (the agenda was arranged by Jawrg Goldbrick, assistant headche in the PE department and intramuddle director); 8 a.m.—Physical Education girls lay on the floor and wiggle-waggled unclad legs back and forth to music furnished by a record player. PE boys stood on the sidelines and ogled (editor's note: Ogling was apparently a very popular sport of yesteryears, but is non-existent today. 9 a.m.—Same as 8 a.m., 10 o'clock—no change, 11 a.m.—girls still wiggle-waggled—boys still ogled, 12 o'clock—girls went to eat—boys followed.

Fate of the beloved gymnasium is rather sad to relate. It was razed by the action of a careless student, who loved the edifice like all good Techsians used to do. An engineering major, passing by the gymnasium, tossed a still-burning cigarette butt indiscriminately into a can of gasoline that was sitting, for some unknown reason, by the side of the revered structure. The building blazed up despite valiant efforts made by both students and faculty members to save it. A bucket brigade was quickly formed, and the endeavor to squelch the flames might have been a success if an error in judgment had not been made. High octane gasoline was poured on the flames instead of water.

Tech students, grief-stricken after the conflagration, showed their courageous spirits and understanding hearts by electing to Student Council presidency the boy who was responsible for the hell-razing.
