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## New Texas Interscholastic League Rules Won't Work" Says Coach Dell Morgan

"Rules are absurd, they won't
work." That's what Dell Morgan,

has to say about the Texas Interscholastic league's move to control recruiting practices of Southwestern colleges and universities.
The two major proposals that received coach Morgan's condemnation as released by the TIL's advisory council after Saturday's
meeting at Austin are:

1. The barring of official visitation to college campuses by a prospective athlete while the boy is
participating in a sport, and prior
to his graduation. In case of visitation being permisible under above
regulation, the visit would be allowable only on non-school days.

2. The allowing of contact with
athletic prospects by coaches or
scouts at the home high school
during non-schedule hours only,
and only after clearance by school
authorities. All contacts would be
limited to that portion of the year
sollowing the close of football season.



That was the main complaint—the performance just kept rolling on and on until it presently came to a stop. The curtains parted at 8 p.m. and closed for the last time about 10:20. Had there been more expertitiming and no long pauses between scenes, the production would probably have taken no more than two hours.
And somehow the intermission between acts one and two was coms pletely lost. Not until the second act was concluded was there a chance for a break.

But the ill-judged timing was overshadowed by the numbers themselves, some of them included in a light to the unfavorable.
