| Further landscaping is planned for the campus during the spring months, Mark Gosdin, assistant college landscape architect, said yesterday. <br> The president's home is to be relandscaped and fences are to be moved back to permit enlarging of the yard, Gosdin said. Older shrubs are to be removed and new ones are to be planted, he sald. <br> Plans are being made to replant in front of the Ad building and to set out trees and shrubbery around the museum and Library. Some planting is to be done around the east end of the Library and Chemistry buildings, Gosdin said. It is planned to rearrange and plant near all the dorms, he added. <br> The landscape architects are try- | mind in their landscaping so that in the future these plants will not have to be changed because they have grown too large or have died, the assistant said. <br> Plans are also being made for top dressing all lawns with manure, Gosdin said. First the lawns are to be smoothed so they can be more easily mown, then organic matter is to be added to hold water and provide better growth, he added. <br> In planting and landscaping in front of buildings, an effort is being made to make the buildings look attractive, yet at the same time cut down on maintenance as much as possible, the architect said. <br> Planting will not begin until old plants can be removed in some |
