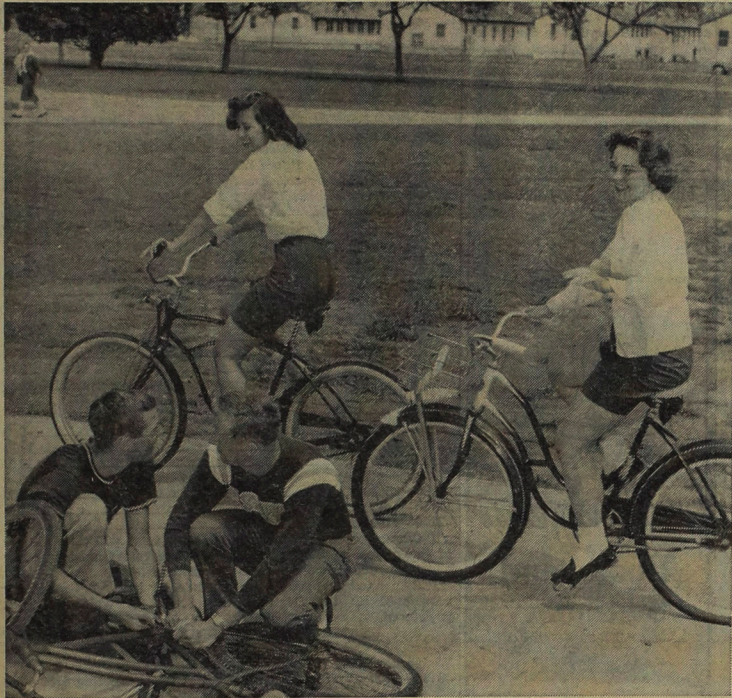


Techsans Head For Fun Race, Carnival, Fair Are Today's Events



COEDS GO AHEAD OF TECH MALES IN BICYCLE RACE PRACTICE
... Girls' race begins at 1:15 p.m. this afternoon on the campus circle

The "Little 500" bicycle race, a Senior Carnival "saloon" and a Tech Union-sponsored "Frantic Fun Fair" are a few of the holiday atmosphere events that students at Texas Tech will find around the campus today.

Tech girls are scheduled to start their competition in the bike race at 1:15 p.m. to be followed by the boys' race which will be "flagged off" at approximately 2 p.m.

After the bicycle race has been completed, Tech Seniors will open ten booths sponsored by student organizations on the West side of Student Union Bldg. for a "carnival."

The carnival was formerly scheduled for the Ad bldg parking lot. The "saloon" will be entered by Zeta Tau Alpha. Other booths include a penny pitch by the Phi Psi's and a hoop throwing contest by the Theta's. The booth making the most money will be awarded a trophy.

To cap the day, the Tech Union will have as its Frantic Fun Fair theme A "Maverick Madhouse" which will open at 7:30 p.m.

The games and tournament committee will turn the Union into a gambling hall featuring roulette, dice, poker, black jack and other games of chance. All betting will be done with specially printed "Union Money."

Drinks will be served at the "bar" and a featured attraction will be a melodrama starring members of the Union program council.

Carlyle Smith, director of the bicycle race, has stipulated that the girls' teams should be at the pit area and the boys' teams at the Double T bench at 12:45 p.m. The officials will meet in front of the Ad Bldg. at the same time to receive their assignments.

Trophies will be awarded first, second and third places in both divisions as well as a sportsmanship award. Judges will be Bob Parson, Alpha Phi Omega; Mike Montgomery, Saddle Tramps and Jim Bell, Circle K and director of last year's race.

Penalties will be incurred when someone steps out of the pit onto the track or when crossing someone's pit. These infractions will cause extra laps to be given. Un-

'Invalid' Ends Season

"The Imaginary Invalid," a farce concerning a thoroughgoing hypochondriac who tries to stop a flood of medical bills by marrying his eldest daughter to a doctor, will close the season for the Tech speech department in the speech auditorium Tuesday through May 10.

All seats are reserved for the presentation and are \$1 general admission or free with a student identification card.

First presented in 1622, the play centers around Monsieur Argan, the imaginary invalid, who is a hypochondriac. Besieged by doctor bills, Argan decides to marry Angelique, his eldest daughter, to a doctor in order to receive better and cheaper attention. But alas, Angelique loves another.

Ignoring his daughter's pleas, Argan

picks a rather stupid young man for his purpose. Toinette the maid, and Berald, Argan's brother, do everything possible to dissuade Argan, eventually showing up the doctors as the fools they are. Angelique marries her true love and Argan is persuaded to solve his problem by becoming a doctor himself.

Main members of the cast are Jo Fields, Toinette; Barry Corbin, Argan; Sandra Clark, Angelique; and Louis Young, Berald. Others are Karla Alexander, Lee Sullenger, Dwight Bellamy, Bill Leonard, Tom Worstell, Rick Malone, Nancy Gaspy and Bob Nelms.

Written by Moliere in the 1600's, the play is set in the splendor of the 17th century, during the reign of Louis XIV. The play will feature specially designed costumes and wigs which the students made themselves.

Jean Schepers Named Woman Of Year

Jean Schepers, Texas Tech senior from McGregor, was announced Woman of the Year Thursday night at a banquet given by the Association of Women Students.

Miss Schepers was nominated by Alpha Lambda Delta; Dean of Women Florence Phillips announced the winner.

"Being chosen Woman of the Year is one of the most exciting things that have happened to me since I've been at Tech," said the petite home economics education major. "It's a great honor to be chosen by the women of Texas Tech."

Miss Schepers was president of AWS this year. She is a member of Mortar Board, Pi Beta Phi, Phi Kappa Phi and Phi Upsilon Omicron. She was a member of the Junior Council last year.

Title of "Woman of the Year" is an award made annually on Women's Day by the Association of Women Students. All women students are members of this organization.

In 1925, when Tech was founded, a convocation was called of all women students and the Women Students Association was organized "to furnish an opportunity for expression by all students and serve as training for citizenship for the girls."

Four years later when they were accepted into the Inter-Collegiate Association of Women Students, AWS was founded.

Today, AWS is the principle coordinating body of all women's organizations, and includes the Women's Residence Council and Judiciary Council.

Architecture Professor Gets Fulbright Award

James Ingraham Clark, assistant professor of architecture and allied arts at Tech, has received a Fulbright Lectureship for next year. The award is for lecturing in architecture and urban design at the Finland Institute of Technology in Helsinki, Finland. After graduating from the U-

niversity of Michigan, College of Architecture, Clark gained experience in large architectural offices in New York and St. Louis. In 1948, "Progressive Architecture" magazine selected one of his residential designs as one of the eight most outstanding built in the United States. An "honorable mention" award for a school project followed in 1949.

Tech Professor To Be Speaker

Dr. Jay B. Hubbell, Tech English professor, will be guest speaker at a banquet held by Sigma Tau Delta, English honorary fraternity, at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Holiday Inn Motel.

Dr. Hubbell will speak on "Elen Glassgow, the First Modern Southern Novelist." He is an English professor emeritus from Duke University who is teaching this year at Tech.

He moved his practice to Corpus Christi in 1955 and there his I.B.M. Building received an award as "The Outstanding Building Constructed in the Texas Coastal Bend Area during 1956."

In 1957 he was invited to be "Visiting Critic" at the University of Virginia School of Architecture. The following year he became a member of the Tech staff.

Clark is now on leave lecturing and doing graduate work at the University of Southern California. He has requested an extension of his leave in order to accept the award, and will return to Lubbock in the fall of 1961.

Phi Delts End Scout Project

The Texas Epsilon Chapter of Phi Delta Theta celebrated the fifth annual Community Service Day Saturday by returning to the site of last year's project to put on some finishing touches.

Last year the Phi Delts built an outdoor altar for devotional purposes at the Boy Scout Camp at Post, Texas.

Girls Write Letters

Fish Council Seeks Cheerleader Change

A proposal to change the method for electing cheerleaders will be submitted to the Student Council Tuesday night by Jerry Parsons, president of the Freshman Council.

Parsons said the proposal — nicknamed "Operation Change" — calls for selection of a screening committee to choose "qualified candidates" from those who wish to run for the position.

He said those chosen would then be voted on by the student body. Other proposals include a lowering of the number of semester hours required for eligibility from 60 to 32. Parsons pointed out that this would make sophomores eligible and give a wider choice range.

A third suggested change would add a third woman cheerleader, bringing the total to six. "This would give balance to the cheerleading group and make them more effective in the larger stadiums of the Southwest Conference," Parsons said.

"The screening committee would select candidates on the basis of coordination, spirit, personality displayed during the try-outs and tumbling ability."

The proposal suggests that the Student Council elections committee set up the screening committee. Possible members mentioned include two or more faculty members, band director, Saddle Tramps president, student body president, cheerleaders of previous years and the head cheerleader from the previous year.

"Other colleges and universities across the country allow a similar committee to make final selections of cheerleaders. At least one high school in the area has turned selection of cheerleaders over to such a committee," he said.

Jacques Fouchet, French consul general at Houston, will speak on "Some Aspects of Contemporary France," at the annual awards dinner at the Union Ballroom.

Citations and awards will be given outstanding students in the various languages offered by the department. Also to be honored are officers of the departmental clubs and members of Sigma Delta Pi, national Spanish honor society, and Pi Delta Phi, national French honor society.

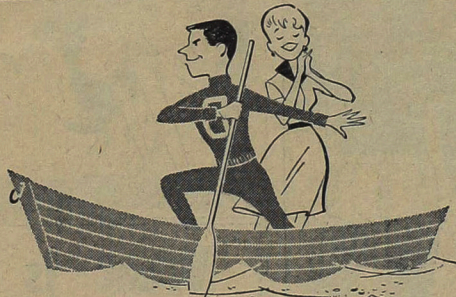

Picadors Outhit Amarillo JC, 10 - 5

The Texas Tech Picadors, powered by the bats of Charles Harrison and Cagle Davis, ran by Amarillo Junior College 10-5 at the Tech diamond Friday.

Harrison broke up a pitching duel between Tech's Bill Easterwood and Amarillo's Carl Ikard when he hit a grand slam homer deep into center field to push the Picadors ahead by five runs.

DAVIS' DRIVE went into the same spot and was hit with no men on base. The blast started a rally that gave Tech Tech two important insurance runs.

Easterwood set the Badgers down in order for two innings. The bottom half of the second saw eight men come to the plate for

Tech. After Harrison had flown out to left, Yip Rankin drove a grounder to deep short for a hit and went to second on a wild pitch.

DARWIN HILLIARD, Picador first baseman, brought Rankin home with a single and went to second on the throw home. Three straight walks followed and then Bobby Flannigan, leadoff man, hit into a fielder's choice which scored Dennis Willett, who had walked.

In the third, Easterwood faced five men with a walk and an error marking the inning. In Tech's half, three men walked but no runs scored.

THE BADGERS' HALF of the fourth was a nightmare for the Picadors. Helped along by three Tech errors, Amarillo sent eight men to bat and collected three runs to even up the contest.

With two men out, Badger centerfielder Herb Reynolds walked and advanced to third on Don Graham's bingle. Charles Harrison, Tech third baseman, then committed a two base error on a ball hit by Jerry Smith which let in one tally. Willett then let a ball pass him and another run came across the plate. Smith then scored on a second miscue by Harrison. Mike

Poe forced out Fred Cauthon at third to end the inning.

EASTERWOOD, Flannigan and Doug Gibbins all singled to open the Picadors' half of the fourth. Davis walked and brought in a run, then Harrison made up for his two errors when he hit the first pitch offered him for a grand slam. Ten men went to bat for Tech that inning.

Everything went smoothly for both teams until the eighth, when each team scored two runs. Easterwood was taken out in the eighth after pitching 7 1-3 innings. He allowed five runs on nine hits, walked four and struck out nine. Ramey Brandon, Bovina right-hander, came in to preserve the victory for Easterwood.

The game ended the Picadors' season and saw them finish with a respectable 8-3 record. Ralph Atkinson has coached them all season.

Senior Netters Battle Steers

Four Texas Tech netters play their final collegiate matches in Lubbock with the University of Texas today.

COACH George Philbrick will pit seniors Bob Macy and Johnny Kniffen against Wilmer Allison's Longhorns.

Texas is ranked with SMU and Rice as the top three in the conference.

TECH'S No. 1 netter, Macy, has lost only two matches in Southwest Conference round-robin play the past two seasons. Texas' Richard Keeton downed him last year and Rice's Paul Como marred his 1960 record in a three-set match at Houston Tuesday.

Lubbock's Danny Scales, junior, will probably play No. 2 singles, Kniffen No. 3, and sophomores Derald Breneman of Honolulu, No. 4.

Admission is free to the matches, scheduled to start at 1:30. They will be played in the varsity courts just east of the old Tech Gym.

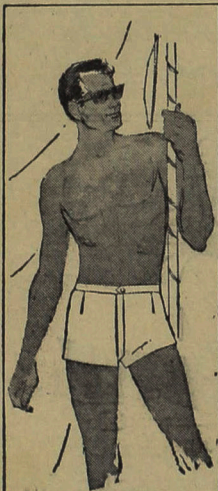
