

College football in the smaller schools could be almost obliv-iated and football could become more of a profession in large colleges if the National Collegiate Athletic association follows the suggestions of some member conferences. The Southwest conference is among those requesting the abilition of the Sanity code which has kept college sports on a semi-professional level. Abolition of the code would obviously improve football of the richer conferences. In like manner it would decrease the in-terest in the game in the smaller conferences. More than a sports program is involved in the decision of the NCAA officials, however. The decision will determine whether schools will be the owner of a professional football team (which is no role for education) or merely leave sports as the predominant part and not the dominating part of a school. To make no decision on the code will leave colleges the privilege of continuing their abuse of it, increasing its ineffect-ioness.





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
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
