It is one thing to protest the Vietnam War. It is another thing to protest administrative policies. Only a poor leader would hurt the Moratorium by strongly implying that participants will not follow direct dministrative statements.
The Tech administration may have been overly restrictive in its handling of this month s Moratorium
requests, but participants still have no ethical or moral right to invite trouble by an "impromptu" march. An impromptu march would take place as manifestation of disgust with Tech's administration. Such a protest against the administration has no
place in the Moratorium movement. For participants themselves, and more

BY CONTINUING to go out of their way to avoid violence, Moratorium workers vindicate themselves
