## Twenty-five Years Ago Today

stead of commenting on the present state of the school, which stead of commenting on the present state of the school, whing place when our school became a reality instead of a plan. ne new West-Texas school One of the largest crowds Lubbock had ever seen, assembled for the opening exercises of the college. Congressman Marvin Jones, Senator L. May field and Pres. R. Q. Lee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce were speakers for the occasion. Three days later Tech's first president, Paul Whitfield Horn, held a reception for the entire student body on the first floor of the Administration building. The student body, expected to number about 500 , turned out to be 1,379 .

Five structures stood on the barren plain that was Tech' campus. The Administration building, Stock Judging pavilion, Textile Engineering building, Home Economics building and the president's home composed the sum of campus now made up the initial staff of the
Lubbock with a population of 4,000 , had one road leading to the campus. And the campus had only one sidewalk. There were no dormitories. Students had come mainly from tied their mounts to straggly mesquite trees. A few modelT's were driven to classes.
