Much emphasis has necessarily been placed on automobile traffic system on the campus. This has resulted in a safer campus for pedestrians. But the recent accidents have proved that the campus is not safe enough, which makes us believe that pedestrians need more help to protect themselves. A better system of traffic lights,-directed more toward those who walk, seems to be a solution.
