Athletic dining hall incomplete

The new athletic dining hall, approved by the Tech Board of Regents last summer and scheduled for completion within the year. has yet to be seen.

Polk Robison, Tech athletic director, said that as far as he knew the blueprints had been released to bidders. "I think the plans were given to the bidder the first of this week," he said. "Bidding should be completed by the end of this month.

THE TECH ATHLETIC Council recommended the dining hall in an attempt to bolster Tech's sagging athletic recruitment program, which for some time has been penalized by inadequate facilities. "This is one of the things we need most for our program. It will have a very vital effect on recruiting," Robison said.

The new facility will be an addition to the Wiggins Complex, and will provide a lounge, meeting rooms and an office for an academic counselor. The dining hall will seat about 225 and will be built with athletic department funds already accumulated.

Norman Igo, director of new construction on the Tech campus, was not available for comment on the delay in construction on the dining hall.

FROM APPROXIMATELY 100 persons who viewed the exhibition before it was officially opened, only one complaint was made of the colorprints that were removed. However, the museum's audience includes local grade school classes, girl scouts and other such organizations.

Lockhart said that had the decision been his he would not have removed the prints. In his opinion, the exhibition has other, more controversial prints which were not removed. He said all the prints were symbolic.

Lockhart and Green agreed that five or eight years ago, the showing of such a contemporary exhibition would not have been possible. Green said if his audience were more sophisticated, he would not have objected to the prints. In an art gallery, such an exhibition would not have received any complaints, he said.

GREEN TOLD the art faculty if they felt his decision was unjust, they could protest to the administration. Although the Museum is not part of the university, it comes under the authority of Murray and the administration because it is located on the Tech campus.

WASHINGTON (AP)-Force will be used soldiers and Marines are available in the if necessary to block a mass march down Pennsylvania Avenue on Nov. 15 to protest the Vietnam war, the Justice Department said yesterday, citing availability of the National Guard and the Army.

"The Army, as far as the District of Columbia is concerned, is always standing by," said Deputy Atty. Gen. Richard G. Kleindienst as he reiterated that there is "a substantial likelihood of serious violence."

HE TOLD NEWSMEN the Guard and the Army will be ready if needed to bolster District of Columbia police, U.S. Park and permit the mass march. Police and the White House police force.

The Pentagon, saying it has started the sponsors on other matters such as precautionary planning, reported 28,000 parking, health and medical facilities.
